#### **Officials Issue Environmental Pipeline Report**

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) - Nebraska environmental regulators have released a preliminary 600-page report on the oil pipeline a Canadian company wants to build across the state. The report released Tuesday doesn't include a recommendation

about whether TransCanada should be allowed to build the Keystone XL pipeline to ship crude oil to Gulf Coast refineries.

The state report says TransCanada's new route avoids the environmental sensitive Sandhills region and addresses a number of concerns Nebraskans raised.

TransCanada spokesman Shawn Howard says the company appreciates the state's attention to detail and hopes the project will be approved.

A public hearing will be held in Albion Dec. 4.

Pipeline opponent Jane Kleeb of Bold Nebraska says she remains concerned, and she's disappointed the state won't require disclosure of exactly what chemicals will be carried in the pipeline.

#### **Daugaard To Appoint Sabers As Circuit Judge**

PIERRE, S.D. (AP) - Gov. Dennis Daugaard announced Tuesday that he will appoint Susan Sabers as a circuit judge in South Dakota's Second Judicial Circuit.

Sabers will replace Judge Kathleen Caldwell, who is retiring at the end of the year. The Second Circuit includes Lincoln and Minnehaha counties.

Sabers is a native of Sioux Falls, where she has been in the private practice of law since 1997. She has been a partner in the law firm of Fuller & Sabers since 2006.

#### Red Meat Production Up In South Dakota

SIOUX FALLS (AP) — The U.S. Department of Agriculture says commercial red meat production in South Dakota totaled 91.1 million pounds in September

The agency says that's up 2 percent from a year ago and up 6 percent from August.

Commercial hog slaughter for South Dakota totaled 415,600 dur-ing September, compared to 404,300 head the year before. The average live weight was 266 pounds, up 2 pounds from a year earlier. Commercial sheep and lamb slaughter for South Dakota totaled

300 during September. That was unchanged from a year earlier. The average live weight was 118 pounds, the same weight as the previous year.

#### Nebraska Medical Center Announces Layoffs

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) - Nebraska Medical Center in Omaha will lay off 38 workers by the end of the year and won't fill vacant positions as it adjusts to health care reforms.

The hospital announced the decision Tuesday, citing reducing costs, changes in the marketplace and a reduction in the growth of Medicare spending.

The center has about 5,200 employees. Spokesman Paul Baltes says it's the first time in 10 years that it has cut jobs.

He says the hospital has been working for years to reduce costs. With a slowing of the increase in Medicare funding, the efforts are "being accelerated."

A few staff members will see their hours reduced. Hospital officials say they'll work to place workers in spots within the system and at partner organizations.

## **GOP Groups Invest In Neb., N.M. Senate Races**

WASHINGTON — A Republican-leaning outside group is investing in Nebraska's suddenly tighter Senate race, looking to shore up Republican Deb Fischer as she tries to turn back Democrat Bob Kerrey's bid to return to the Senate.

Press&Dakotan

American Crossroads, the group organized by Republican operative Karl Rove, is spending \$420,000 on the race and will unveil an ad on Wednesday. Republicans and Democrats say the race has narrowed since recent polls showed Fischer with a double-digit lead in the GOP-leaning state.

"At the end of the day, the U.S. Senate can't afford people like Bob Kerrey," said Nate Hodson, a spokesman for American Crossroads and Crossroads GPS

Kerrey has been airing an ad that criticizes Fischer and her husband for suing an elderly couple and neighbors for land that the Fischers had used for their cattle. The ad focuses on the 1995 lawsuit and the 104 acres owned by the late Les and Betty Kime. It includes Nebraskans speaking out against Fischer and questioning her character.

Kerrey is a former governor, senator and one-time presidential candidate who was heavily recruited by top Democrats to seek the seat of retiring Democratic Sen. Ben Nelson.

American Crossroads' affiliate, Crossroads GPS, made a \$5.3 million ad buy on Tuesday, with new commercials to air in Nevada,

North Dakota, Ohio and Virginia - all competitive races - as well as Maine and New Mexico.

The National Republican Senatorial Committee has ended its spending in Maine, where independent and former Gov. Angus King is leading the polls. ## Dead Family's Relatives Sue Trucker For Neb. Crash

One of the drivers died in the September accident and another is facing manslaughter charges. The lawsuit alleges that truck driver, Josef Slezak, had been on the road for too long.

The lawsuit was filed late Monday in U.S. District Court of Nebraska by the parents of Christopher and Diana Schmidt, a Gaithersburg, Md., couple who were killed along with their two young children and unborn son.

The Schmidts were in separate cars, waiting in standstill traffic after a collision on Interstate 80 about 40 miles east of the Wyoming border, when authorities say Slezak struck Christopher Schmidt's car. The force of the crash pushed Schmidt's car into his wife's, which was rammed underneath another semi, and both of their cars exploded. The couple's two children were in the car with their mother, who was 7 1/2 months pregnant.

Slezak, 36, of River Grove, Ill., is charged with four counts of manslaughter, four counts of vehicular homicide, and one count of vehicle homicide of an unborn child. A phone message was left Tuesday with Slezak's criminal attorney, Kelly Breen.

A woman who answered the phone for Slezak's employer, AKI Trucking Inc., which is also named in the suit, declined to comment.

The lawsuit also targets truck driver Vladimir Zhukov and his employers, Swift-Truck Lines Ltd., and MTR Express Inc. The accident began Zhukov's semi suffered a mechanical failure and stopped on the interstate near the town of Potter. The lawsuit alleges Zhukov, of Oak Park, Ill., failed to move the truck out of the roadway when his air brakes stopped working, and that he or his employer neglected to keep up with the truck's maintenance. Zhukov pulled the tractor off the interstate, but the trailer remained in the road, according to the lawsuit.

MTR Express Inc. declined to comment Tuesday.

The lawsuit also names Long Haul Trucking Inc., the employer for trucker Keith Johnson, who died; and North Metro Truck Leasing LLC, which the lawsuit says provided him with the truck. Messages were left with the other companies.

Johnson's truck slammed into Zhukov's, triggering a fire that blocked traffic. The lawsuit alleges Johnson, 27, of Big Lake, Minn., failed to avoid the crash even though Zhukov's truck was flashing its emergency-warning lights.

James Chalat, a Denver attorney who is representing the relatives and the family's estate, said the defendants had not yet been served with the lawsuit.

The Schmidts were moving back to their native Sacramento, Calif., to be closer to family, Chalat said. Christopher, a U.S. Air Force veteran who worked for the Department of Energy in Washington, had landed a new job with the U.S. Social Security Administration in California. The lawsuit was filed by Diana's parents, Bradley and Nancy Baumann of Rocklin, Calif., and Christopher's mother, Donna Costley, of Antelope, Calif.

"Everyone is still in a state of shock," Chalat said Tuesday. "This was a very close family. All of the grandchildren were very close to their grandparents. They were very close to cousins, and Christopher and Diana both came from big families."

Investigators say Slezak slammed into the back of Christopher Schmidt's car at 75 mph, without hitting his brakes. The family died instantly.

Slezak, a citizen of the Czech Republic, is awaiting trial in Cheyenne County District Court.


The lawsuit alleges Slezak violated federal highway safety rules by staying on the road far longer than the maximum time allowed for truckers. Federal rules require truckers to be off-duty for at least 10 hours before they can drive, sets a 14-hour maximum of windshield time, and then mandates that they take another 10 hours off-duty. Slezak had exceeded the maximum by at least three hours, according to the lawsuit.
