Adelman And Saunders Bond In Minnesota

MANKATO, Minn, (AP) — Flip Saunders took over as Minnesota Timberwolves president of basketball operations in May and he has been shaking hands and kissing babies ever since. The social butterfly has met with everyone from his star power forward to those responsible for the music in the arena as he tries to put his fingerprints on the organization.

Rick Adelman has been the coach in Minnesota for more than two years, and there are still plenty of people in the organization who have never spoken to him for more than a minute. It's all basketball, all the time for him,

which means there is no time for small talk.

Saunders can most often be seen cloaked in one of his tailored suits, splashing some color with a well-placed pocket square and finishing the look with a tie clip here, a set of cuff links there.

Adelman wears black. All the time. On special occasions he'll dress up his look by donning a black sweater vest over his black polo shirt.

The leaders of the Timberwolves live in different worlds socially and sartorially, but they have found common ground where it matters most — on the

They are still getting to know each other after Saunders took over for the departed David Kahn. But the connection has been an easy one despite their superficial differences. At their cores, they are both coaches and thus they speak the same lan-

guage There's probably not a day that we talk to each other that we don't talk about some type of X's and O's, some type of offense," said Saunders, who is in his first year as a top executive after 16 years as coach of the Wolves, Pistons and Wizards. "That's just



Navy later confirmed its home game against Air Force in Annapolis, Md., would be played as scheduled Saturday. The game is sold out and is the most notable one on the Midshipmen's home schedule. The Army-Navy game at the end of the season is played at a neutral site.
