For . 18 years (1980-98), he was a faculty member in the University of Southern California Department of Neurology where he established one of the first stroke programs on the West Coast. To date. his stroke research has received more than 25 years of funding from NIH, and he has been cited for more than a

decade by Best Doctors in America and Castle Connolly's America's Top Doctors. From 2007-2009, Fisher was the recipient of the Orange County Medical Association's Physician of Excellence Award.

Named for William O. "Doc" Farber (1910-2007), who led a distinguished career in political science at USD for more than three decades, the Farber Forum Lecture Series aims to provide students and the public with insight into national and state politics, campaigns and elections, public administration issues and international relations.

Mental Illness Awareness Week (MIAW) is Oct. 6-12 and is an opportunity to learn more about serious mental illnesses such as major depression, bipolar disorder and schizophrenia, according to the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI).

It's an opportunity to make a difference.

Join NAMI, Yankton National Disabilities Employment Awareness Month (NDEAM), and Yankton Area Mental Wellness for the presentation by the performers of "Handicap This!," at Mount Marty College at 7 p.m. Monday, Oct. 7. (The show "Handicap This!", which promotes an anti-stigma message, will be presented at 3 p.m. Sunday at MMC's Marian Auditorium.) The

NAMI Annual Candlelight Vigil will also be part of Monday program. Profes-sional credit will be requested for this presentation.

Mental illness does not discriminate. It can strike anyone at any time. Fortunately recovery is possible. Treatment works, but only if a person can get it.

One in four adults experiences a mental health problem in any given year. One in five young people aged 13 to 18 also experience mental illness. In fact, one-half of all mental illness begins by the age of 14 — three quarters by age 24.

Unfortunately, there are long delays – sometimes decades-between the first appearance of symptoms and when people get help. Less than one-third of

adults and less than one-half of children with a diagnosed illness receive treatment.

Everyone needs to understand the nature of mental illness and learn the symptoms of different conditions. Fact sheets about specific diagnoses and treatment options are available from the National Alliance of Mental Illness (NAMI) at www.nami.org.

Thé U.S. Surgeon General has reported that stigma is a major barrier to people seeking help when they need it. That's why MIAW is so important. The more people know, the better they can help themselves or help their loved ones get the support they need.
