KNOX CO. SHERIFF'S REPORT

On Sept. 26, 2013, the Knox County Sheriff's Office investigated a report of road signs being knocked down on 517th Ave., south of 872nd Rd. Sometime during the overnight hours someone intentionally drove a pickup over a "School Bus Stop Ahead" sign, located just north of Cory Adam's residence. The driver of the pickup then continued north on 517th Ave. and intentionally drove over the "Stop Ahead" sign located 1/4 mile south of the intersection of 517th Ave. and 872nd Rd. Approximately 1/8 mile north of that sign, the driver intentionally drove over a mailbox, belonging to Brian Smith. It appears at that point the pickup began to rapidly lose motor oil and was driving on a flat tire. The driver then again intentionally drove off the road and drove over the stop sign and intersection marker sign located at the intersection of 517th Ave. and 872nd Rd, before continuing north on 517th Ave.

Anyone with information about who may be responsible for this damage is encouraged to call the Knox County Sheriff's Office at 402-288-4261.

On Oct. 2, 2013, a Search Warrant was served on two residences in Verdigré, Neb., by officers from the Verdigré Police Department, the Knox County Sheriff's Office, and the SNARE Drug Task Force. The Search Warrant was issued after an investigation by the Verdigré Police Department. Items seized by the Officers included controlled substances packaged for resale. Jon Gerald Ruzicka, 53, of Verdigré, was arrested on an Knox County Warrant for contributing to the delinquency of a minor, a misdemeanor. Because of the seizure of controlled substances at his residence located by the Verdigré School, Ruzicka was also arrested for Possession of a Controlled Substance with Intent to Deliver in a drug free school zone, a felony. Ruzicka was booked into the Knox County Jail.

This investigation was made possible by numerous tips and input from the public, which greatly aided the investigation and again shows the importance of the public getting involved in helping to protect a community and it's children.

Mental Illness Awareness Week Oct. 6-12

Mental Illness Awareness Week (MIAW) is Oct. 6-12 and is an opportunity to learn more about serious mental illnesses such as major depression, bipolar disorder and schizophrenia, according to the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI).

It's an opportunity to make a difference.

Join NAMI, Yankton National Disabilities Employment Awareness Month (NDEAM), and Yankton Area Mental Wellness for the presentation by the performers of "Handicap This!," at Mount Marty College at 7 p.m. Monday, Oct. 7. (The show "Handicap This!", which promotes an anti-stigma message, will be presented at 3 p.m. Sunday at MMC's Marian Auditorium.) The

NAMI Annual Candlelight Vigil will also be part of Monday program. Professional credit will be requested for this presentation.

Mental illness does not discriminate. It can strike anyone at any time. Fortunately recovery is possible. Treatment works, but only if a person can get it.

One in four adults experiences a mental health problem in any given year. One in five young people aged 13 to 18 also experience mental illness. In fact, one-half of all mental illness begins by the age of 14 — three quarters by age 24.

Unfortunately, there are long delays — sometimes decades-between the first appearance of symptoms and when people get help. Less than one-third of

adults and less than one-half of children with a diagnosed illness receive treatment.

Everyone needs to understand the nature of mental illness and learn the symptoms of different conditions. Fact sheets about specific diagnoses and treatment options are available from the National Alliance of Mental Illness (NAMI) at www.nami.org.

The U.S. Surgeon General has reported that stigma is a major barrier to people seeking help when they need it. That's why MIAW is so important. The more people know, the better they can help themselves or help their loved ones get the support they need.

Fisher To Speak At USD's Farber Hall Monday

VERMILLION — The Political Science League at the University of South Dakota and the W.O. Farber Center for Civic Leadership will host an address from Dr. Mark Fisher, M.D., entitled, "Emotion & Politics," at 4 p.m. on Monday, Oct. 7, at Farber Hall in Old Main. The lecture, free and open to the public, is part of the Farber Forum Lecture Series.

Fisher, a professor of neurology, anatomy and neurobiology, political science, and pathology and laboratory medicine at the University of California, Irvine, received his M.A. from USD

in 1972. At UCI, he served as chair of the department of neurology from 1998 to 2006, established the UCI Stroke Center and led the UCI Department of Neurology into the top 10 for NIH research funding for neurology departments nationwide. For 18 years (1980-98), he was a faculty member in the University of Southern California Department of Neurology where he established one of the first stroke programs on the West Coast. To date, his stroke research has received more than 25 years of funding from NIH, and he has been cited for more than a

decade by Best Doctors in America and Castle Connolly's America's Top Doctors. From 2007-2009, Fisher was the recipient of the Orange County Medical Association's Physician of Excellence Award.

Named for William O. "Doc" Farber (1910-2007), who led a distinguished career in political science at USD for more than three decades, the Farber Forum Lecture Series aims to provide students and the public with insight into national and state politics, campaigns and elections, public administration issues and interna-

tional relations.

USD's Political Science League, a non-partisan student organization, is dedicated to providing opportunities that facilitate political discourse on current local, national, and international issues in order to generate heightened political awareness in the student body and community.
