Fish And Wildlife Facilities Closed Due To Shutdown

LAKEWOOD, Colo. — The Federal Government is closed because current funding expired on Sept. 30. Due to this lack of funding, all U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service lands and facilities are currently closed to the public. Oct. 12-14 begins the South Dakota Resident-Only ring-necked pheasant small game season. However, Waterfowl Production Areas are closed to these and other activities.

The Service is very much aware that any lapse in appropriations imposes hardships on those we serve. While a lapse in appropriations remains in effect,

public access to Service lands is prohibited. This includes all public recreation, such as hunting, on National Wildlife Refuges and Waterfowl Production Areas. In the event the Federal Government resumes normal activities by the beginning of the pheasant season, a news release will be issued to notify the public.

State Historical Society Seeks Public Preservation Input

PIERRE — The State Historical Preservation Office (SHPO) of the South Dakota State Historical Society in Pierre is preparing for its federal fiscal year 2014 grant application and invites public comment through Oct. 31 on the state's preservation needs and projects.

The SHPO manages the National Register of Historic Places program of the National Park Service in South Dakota. The office relates historic preservation to economic, social and educational state objectives. It surveys, inventories and registers historical properties; and it promotes public awareness and provides technical assistance on their preservation.

Among the questions to consider are:

- What properties or areas need to be inventoried?

- What properties should be considered for nomination to the National Register of Historic Places?

- What properties are at-risk or endangered?
- What kinds of technical preservation assistance are beneficial?

"Public input or responses to these questions will help the program in preparing its annual work plan," said Jay D. Vogt, director of the State Historical Society. "And preservation promotes economic development and cultural tourism."

be the location of the inaugural event. Yankton earned that name as the Dakota Territory capital from 1861 to 1883.

"The committee did wonder how in the world it would be done because it doesn't have any money," Hunhoff said. "They did agree that if we wanted to do it, God bless us, and they would help any way they could short of financial contributions."

A Yankton Quasiquintennial Committee was formed and planning for the approaching Nov. 2 deadline commenced.

South Dakota became a state on Nov. 2, 1889.

Hunhoff said various statewide events are being planned by the governor-appointed committee, including something in Pierre for November 2014.

Among the other happenings will be a covered wagon ride between Yankton and Pierre that will likely take place after Labor Day.

"We're hoping to do a lasting legacy project on the state level," Hunhoff added. "Everybody agrees that if we do it, we should do it in the spirit of Gov. George Mickelson. He wanted a reconciliation with our Native American friends."

Various ideas are under consideration, he stated.

As the Inaugural Ball in Yankton approaches, Yankton Convention and Visitors Bureau Director Lisa Scheve said assistance is needed.

"There is a need for volunteers," she stated. "We need re-enactors. We're also going to need help directing traffic. Most of all, we need people to participate. We need people to dress up and come to the ball."

We need participants just as much as volunteers."

Donations are also needed. "We do have some costs associated with it," Scheve said. "We're making this free and open to the public so everyone can participate in the historic event."

All ages are welcome to attend, and it is expected that school children will be involved with some of the observance.

"We want children there," Scheve said. "They are the ones who are our future. This is a chance to show them what South Dakota is all about."

At this point, Daugaard and Lt. Gov. Matt Michels are not confirmed for the ball, but it is anticipated they will attend.

"We'll invite all the constitutional officers, state legislators and former legislators from this area," Hunhoff said.

Here is the schedule of events:

- 3:30-5:30 p.m. — a walking tour of Historic Downtown Yankton;
- 6-7 p.m. — a social hour at the Riverfront Event Center;
- 7-7:30 p.m. — a special program celebrating the signing of statehood;
- 7:30-11 p.m. — 125th anniversary statehood ball with music provided by the Gale Pifer Orchestra.

Guests are encouraged to dress in period-appropriate costumes, and prizes will be awarded for the best of the evening.

CHICAGO (AP) — Grain futures were lower Tuesday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for December delivery fell 1.25 cents to \$6.935 a bushel; December corn fell 7.5 cents to 4.4175 a bushel; December oats were .75 cent lower at \$3.1675 a bushel; while November soybeans dropped 7.75 cents to \$12.8875 a bushel.

Beef and pork prices rose on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. December live cattle rose .02 cent to \$1.3232 a pound; November feeder cattle was .85 cent higher at \$1.6632 a pound; while December lean hogs were .33 cent higher at \$8.820 a pound.
