member, said the event is held to put a spotlight on the impacts of domestic violence.

"One of the reasons we do this every single year is to create awareness of domestic violence in our community," Warren-Johnson said, "and to really honor the survivors and victims that are in our community."

She said the area has seen a large rise in reported cases of domestic violence. She said in 2012, 169 calls were made to 911 pertaining to domestic violence.

"That number is pretty jaw-dropping when you consider how big our community is," she said. "In 2012, our agency saw record-breaking shelter nights for people in imminent danger who sought shelter through our agency. We had 1,146 shelter nights, which is almost double what we see in a year."

Crompton-Tetter gave her audience a glimpse at how domestic violence has a far-reaching impact on the lives of the victim and everyone around them.

"Domestic violence not only affects the survivor, but it also affects the survivor's children, the person who was or is abusive, the health care system, the criminal justice system, business, families, friends and society," she said. "The cost to children is cumulative over time — from emotional disturbance while living in a house where there is domestic violence in childhood, to sometimes reenacting this violence in adulthood, to just having emotional problems in adulthood."

She added that she has seen her speaking engagements help others in the past. "I speak frequently to high schools about Jenny's story and there are always young girls who will come up to me afterwards and tell me their own stories and ask for help," she said. "I always direct them to the school counselor or domestic violence agency. Sometimes there are young men who will come up and say 'I think I'm like Mark Smith,' and they will ask for help, which I think is wonderful."

She ended her talk Wednesday by saying the key to combating the problem of abuses is recognizing its impacts.

"We have to continue fighting against this in our society," she said. "We need to recognize that it exists. We have to agree that it is more than just a women's issue; it is a societal issue that affects everyone of us in some way."

Warren-Johnson said that one of the most important things victims of domestic abuse do is try to reach out for help.

"I know as an advocate that one of the hardest steps as a victim is reaching out and asking for help," she said. "My advice to victims and the community alike is that if you see this abuse happening or you're experiencing it, just reach out to somebody who can embrace you and empower you and help you get away from these volatile situations."

N.D. School Superintendent Carried Gun To School

A school superintendent in North Dakota who resigned after being caught carrying a handgun to school said Wednesday that he worried about the safety of himself and others at the school because of a confrontation with a student.

D'Wayne Johnston, 49, told The Associated Press in a telephone interview that he brought the weapon to Tioga High School on Oct. 2 because of a threat made by the boy a day earlier that resulted in the student's expulsion. The school board later accepted Johnston's resignation, which is effective at the end of the year.

Tioga Police Chief Sean Duisen said investigators would look into whether Johnston broke any laws, though district officials had not reported it as a crime.

North Dakota was one of several states where legislatures discussed gun laws after last winter's elementary school shooting in Newtown, Conn. North Dakota's Republican-controlled Legislature ultimately rejected a measure that would have allowed people with concealed handgun permits to carry their weapons in schools.

Johnston would not go into detail about the threat but said the student in question had previous discipline problems.

"It led me to believe that a much heightened level of student and staff safety as well as my own was necessary," he said.

"I wouldn't venture into a decision like this lightly. But it was a decision I made on my own."

Johnston now says he should have instead talked to police and asked them for help. Johnston acknowledged carrying the gun after several people noticed it. He then offered to resign, prompting the school board to hold an emergency meeting last Friday.

buildings, bringing travel to a standstill and shutting down schools.

Schools in Rapid City were reopening Wednesday.

Crews were still working to restore power to several thousand customers. The South Dakota wing of the Civil Air Patrol has been flying three airplanes over the western part of the state to locate livestock killed by the storm. The state Department of Public Safety asked the patrol to identify and photograph areas where dead livestock are obstructing state highways or are in road ditches.

Some western South Dakota ranchers have said half of their cattle or more had died. The South Dakota Stockgrowers Association estimates that at least 5 percent of the cattle in the region might have died.

Ranchers and industry officials have said the losses are aggravated by the fact that a government disaster program to help ranchers recover from livestock losses has expired, and ranchers won't be able to get federal help until Congress passes a new farm bill.

Petersen told KOTA-TV that Pennington County is trying to help ranchers dispose of carcasses.

"Our unofficial goal at this point is to establish collection points and then to coordinate with rendering companies that may involve themselves in gathering and collecting those bodies," he said.

Crews also are working to clear thousands of fallen trees from county roads.

"If we don't get those trees out in a couple of weeks and they freeze, they're going to be there all winter," Pennington County Highway Superintendent Heine Junge told the *Journal*.
