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Gazelles Begin State Tennis Tournament Action Today

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Originally, the Yankton Gazelles were scheduled to have six days of rest between the Eastern South Dakota Conference tennis tournament and the state tournament.

Bad weather in Pierre, however, pushed ESD from last Thursday to Monday, leaving Yankton two full days of reprieve.

And so, the Gazelles have to be ready for the S.D. State Girls' Tennis Tournament, which begins today (Thursday) and continues through Saturday in Sioux Falls.

"There's not a turnaround at all,"

head coach Matt Termansen said. With the ESD tournament having been played on a Monday and the team leaving Wednesday for Sioux Falls, there hasn't been much time

between for the Gazelles to rest.

"I think it can be good or bad," Termansen said. "Number one is the school work, that's what is stressing them out the most.

"Playing that much can keep you in shape, though. So we know they won't be rusty."

Yankton is coming off a fourth-place finish at Monday's ESD Tournament, a performance that should provide some kind of momentum heading to state, Termansen said.

"We're looking to build on that," he said. "Some of them beat girls they haven't this year. Being successful there can only help us at

A year ago, the Gazelles finished 11th at state — fifth out of the ESD teams. The goal this year, Termansen said, is to approach the top

"All of the girls are looking for success." he said. "I don't think there's any reason that if a girl loses a match early, that we couldn't come through the losers bracket and be consolation champs."

Of Yankton's six players, three are juniors, one is a senior, one is a freshman and one is an eighth-grader. And four of those six have a winning record in singles' action this season.

The best record for the Gazelles belongs to eighth-grader Anne Knoff, who is 20-9 at flight six. Termansen called her a "human backstop."

"She can sit there and rally all day long, and that frustrates other girls, Termansen said. "She wins a lot of points because the other girl makes a mistake.

"She won't hit a lot of winners, but she doesn't hurt herself." Junior Alexa Bryan boasts the next best record for Yankton, 19-11 at

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The opening 30 minutes were rather solid for the Mount Marty College women's soccer team.

The next 60 weren't, though, and that proved to be the difference — as did the communication.

"Talking is a huge key," MMC freshman Carly Manahan said after Wednesday afternoon's 3-0 loss to Northwestern in Great Plains Athletic Conference action at Yankton's Easton Field.

"If we can, we can find success.'

"We have it in practice; we always communicate," she added. "But it's almost like we freeze up in games."

Northwestern scored twice in a 15-minute span that overlapped the two halves, and later added another goal. And that was all the Red Raiders (5-6-2, 2-2-1)

The visitors dominated the stat sheet with a 30-6 edge in shots, including 12-3 in shots on goal.

"After losing so many games, it's hard to go down like this," said Lancers sophomore Allison Erwin, who led MMC with three shots. "We need to keep everyone fired

Four days after a 10-0 loss to Doane, the Lancers watched Northwestern jump out to an early lead and cruise to an 8-1 win in GPAC action Wednesday at Yankton's Easton Field.

"That was a completely different team at the start," Mount Marty sophomore Levi Gomez said later. "We can't have that. We can't be two different teams.

'Good teams are consistent." The Lancers (4-9, 0-5) were far from that in the opening half, as Gomez pointed out.

Northwestern's cushion was 2-0 after 5:20 of action and 5-0 before 30 minutes had elapsed.

Mount Marty's Levi Gomez scored in the 31st minute, off an assist by Ludwin Arana, to cut the Northwestern lead to 5-1. Within the next 10

minutes, though, the Red Raiders added three more goals.

Not only did the Red Raiders score, but they were balanced. Six different guys had a goal in the first half.

It wasn't exactly the start Mount Marty wanted, according to head coach Nathan Epp.

"We came out flat, with absolutely no intensity," he said. "We were going through the motions.'

What was different in the scoreless second half?

"We opened up more, checked more to each other," Gomez said. "They (Northwestern) were really fast, so we had to make the field bigger. That's when we're the best, when we play outside.'

After dominating the stat in the first half, Northwestern gave up the shots advantage to MMC in the second half but still managed to outshoot the Lancers 24-10 for the game.

It may have been a situation where mistakes started to add up for the Lancers, Epp said.

SIOUX FALLS (AP) — Nate Wolters isn't used to coming off the bench.

He routinely played every minute starring at South Dakota State, after all. Now he's a rookie fighting for playing time with the Milwaukee Bucks, coming back to South Dakota for the first time as a pro for an NBA preseason game against the Minnesota Timberwolves on Thursday.

Wolters said he's ready to jump in and contribute when given the chance.

"I've never really not started my whole life, but that's an adjustment I'll have to make," said Wolters, a St. Cloud, Minn., high school standout. "Whenever I get the opportunity to play, I'll have to come in and bring energy right away."

Wolters, 22, was drafted 38th overall in June by the Washington Wizards before being traded to the Philadelphia 76ers and eventually the Bucks. He should have been selected far higher, South Dakota State coach Scott Nagy said.

Wolters Returning To South Dakota As Pro Nagy said he's heard people underestimate the 6-foot-

4, 190-pound guard's athleticism, and some have questioned whether Wolters will be able to defend against quick guards. But Wolters dedicates time to improving his game more than anybody Nagy said, and the coach thinks his former player will do just fine at the next level.

'Nate's instincts are great because he's played so many games," Nagy said.

Wolters ended his career with the Jackrabbits as the school's all-time leader in points (2,363) and assists (669). He averaged nearly 23 points per game for SDSU last season, when he was a thirdteam All-American.

He got his first taste of higher competition during five NBA Summer League games in Las Vegas, averaging 9.4 points and shooting 41 percent. He ended the July session on a high note, scoring 20 points and grabbing
