4-H Robotics Needs Volunteers, Youth

BROOKINGS - Robots have invaded pop culture and become wildly popular with youth across the world and now SDSU Extension and 4-H wants to expand their presence in South Dakota said Christine Wood, SDSU Extension 4-H STEM Field Specialist.

"Robots are plastered across the big screen in movies like 'Star Wars', 'Transformers', and 'Wall-E'. While science and technology isn't ready to produce a robot like C3PO, it has supplied our world with a variety of other types of robots," Wood said. "Robots are tools that help us achieve things; they have been developed to do work that is too dangerous, precise, dirty, or even boring. Robots work in factories building cars and electronics, explore under the sea and in outer space, serve in our militaries, and work alongside our doctors."

As South Dakota 4-H kicks off a new year, Wood said the organization wants

to expand the Robotics program. We are looking for both youth and adults of any experience level to join us, and invite various other youth organizations and after school programs to partner with us and form 4-H Robotics clubs," she said.

Over the next few months South Dakota 4-H will be holding training for volunteers, troop leaders, educators, or parents interested in leading 4-H Robotics clubs.

Wood explained that robots are also starting to find a home within the educational sector, as they motivate, excite and inspire youth in the areas of science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) through hands-on application.

"The 4-H Robotics program encourages youth to expand their imaginations and develop problem solving, communication, and self-confidence."

she said. South Dakota 4-H will utilize the

National 4-H Junk Drawer Robotics curriculum and Lego Mindstorms platform to expose youth to opportunities within robotics. The 4-H Robotics program encourages youth and adults to work together to develop local 4-H Robotics clubs.

'Starting a robotics club isn't difficult. Volunteers and members work with local SDSU Extension 4-H professionals who will provide training events and serve as mentors and teachers to younger children in after-school programs," Wood said. "They will also determine what level of curriculum is appropriate for their club.'

Wood explained that club members can also decide if they want to get involved with robotics competitions like 4-H Robotics Challenge or FIRST.
