Flooded Farm Land Apps Due Nov. 1

Landowners who qualify for a reduction in assessed value on their flooded crop land must turn the needed paperwork in to their local assessor's office (Director of Equalization) by Nov. 1.

Land that can't be planted because it is flooded may be eligible for a reduction in assessed value. Applications must be submitted each year accompanied by current Farm Service Agency maps with flooded acres clearly marked. The paperwork must be dropped off at the Director of Equalization Office or postmarked by Nov. 1.

Lakes, dugouts and land in the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) are not eligible.

Flooded farm land applications are available at the Director of Equalization Office. In Yankton County, that office is in the County Government Center, 121 West Third Street,

born with this condition each year in the U.S., or 1 out of every 4,344 babies in the U.S. Though surgeries exist to help infants with the condition to help boost heart function, they are never truly cured of the condition and may face life-long complications or possibly require heart transplants. They will also be required to take certain medications for the rest of their life.

Brogun, who's had five surgeries since he was born, is not expected to need another one.
