need to make sure we're safe. And that goes for the general public, too. Watch out for wagons and trucks out there at all hours of the day."

Before the rainfall, farmers in southeast South Dakota were making excellent progress, with the harvest close to or above average in most cases, Johnson said.

This is a stark contrast to 2012, he said.

"This time last year, the harvest was getting pretty much wrapped up," he said. "It's running a little bit late this year because we were cool early and the crop went longer before it matured. But that's good, because you always get better yields when that happens."

More specific crop analysis was unavailable Tuesday, as most U.S. Department of Agriculture services remain closed because of the federal government shutdown.

Johnson said that if the area can now avoid substantial precipitation, farmers should be able to finish this year's harvest within the next few weeks.

According to the National Weather Service, there is little chance of precipitation throughout the next week for the Yankton area.

Should farmers continue on their current pace, the yield for corn and soybeans in the region is expected to be average or above, Johnson said.

"The only disappointing thing about this harvest so far is prices are considerably lower, and in a lot of cases, down at the break-even point," he said.

On the Chicago Board of Trade Tuesday, December corn was priced at \$4.435 a bushel, with November soybeans at \$12.67 a bushel.

Despite decent yields expected this year, it will be difficult for farmers to make a substantial profit at those prices, Johnson said.

"It isn't going to be a terrible year for farmers, but it's not going to be an excellent year either," he said.

we shouldn't get anywhere close to it." Hinting at a lack of support from some fellow Republicans, he declined to predict that the measure would come to a vote by day's end.

Moments later, without naming names, White House spokeswoman Amy Brundage said the House GOP proposal was designed to "appease a small group of tea party Republicans who forced the government shutdown in the first place." Despite its tone, the statement stopped short of a veto threat.

As described by officials, the House GOP proposal would give the Treasury authority to borrow normally through Feb. 7 and reopen the government with enough money to last until Jan. 15.

It would also suspend a medical device tax that is part of "Obamacare," a health care law that Republicans universally opposed when it passed Congress. In addition, it would impose tougher income verification standards on individuals who apply for federal subsidies provided for coverage.

As originally presented to the rank and file, the leadership's plan also stripped the president, vice president, members of the Cabinet and lawmakers of the standard employer contribution toward health care insurance, in their case, money from the government.

Officials said that in a move to pick up support from dissatisfied conservatives, that provision was expanded to cover aides to members of Congress as well. It could raise the out-of-pocket expense for health care coverage by thousands of dollars annually for individuals and families who are affected.

Not all Republicans sounded persuaded.

Rep. Walter Jones, R-N.C., said he was not sure he could vote for the plan because it did not take steps to reduce the accumulation of federal debt. "I have to know a lot more than I know now," he said.

Democrats jumped on Boehner and the plan he produced.

In unusually personal remarks, Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid said the Ohio Republican had "once again tried to preserve his role at the expense of the country."

That was too much for some Republicans who have been among those most vocal in calling for a bipartisan solution to the impasse.

"It's piling on and it's not right," Sen. John McCain, R-Ariz., said of the response from the Democrats. "To categorically reject what the House and the speaker are doing — and I think he's pretty courageous in what he's doing — in my view is not serving the American people."

Beef fell while pork rose on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

December live cattle fell .40 cent to \$1.3275 a pound; November feeder cattle was 1.90 cents lower at \$1.6750 a pound; while December lean hogs were 1.45 cents higher at \$8.8780 a pound.
