**Monday, October 17, 1938**

- Yankton's alert and speedy Greyhounds lived up to their name Saturday night when they ran over and around the heretofore mighty Augustana Vikings to pile up a decisive 14-0 victory.
- Prospects for 85-cent wheat, at least, for farmers next year were held out here Saturday night by Secretary of Agriculture Henry A. Wallace, who spoke at the Corn Palace on a tour of midwest states.

**50 YEARS AGO**

**Thursday, October 17, 1963**

- An increased flow of boxcars should start toward the Midwest Friday. The Association of American Railroads ordered eastern and southern railroads Wednesday to return the badly needed cars to the Midwest. Cars of the Northern Pacific, Great Northern and Soo Line railroads are to be returned, starting Friday.
- Another growing season has produced and ripened another crop

in the "nation's breadbasket," and men of the Mission Hill Congregational church are preparing to harvest the parish corn crop which was planted as an experimental fund-raising last spring.

**25 YEARS AGO**

**Monday, October 17, 1988**

- Huron swept both the boys' and girls' divisions of the Eastern South Dakota Conference cross-country meet, which was held Saturday in Brookings. The Yankton Bucks scored 93 points to finish third in the seven-team field, trailing runner-up Watertown, which had 62 points. Brookings was fourth at 102.
- Garbage disposal was once a simple process in Nebraska communities. Haul the garbage to a dump and dump it. Now city and county officials are scrambling for solutions to waste problems. New regulations expected to be passed by Congress later this year will close 290 unlicensed city dumps operating in the state within the next five years. Highly regulated, licensed landfills will have to be built.
