Yankton Soccer Teams Ready For State Tourney

Bucks Seek Second Straight Title | Gazelles Look To Topple No. 1 Riders



The Yankton Bucks aren't about to settle for one state championship.

They want another one. And so begins a title defense for the third-seeded Bucks, who open play at the South Dakota State High School Soccer Championships today (Thursday) in Sioux Falls.

Yankton (7-1-2), which has allowed the fewest number of goals in the state, faces Pierre (2-3-5) at 9 a.m. today at Yankton Trail Park in Sioux Falls.



Throughout the season, the Bucks have not allowed themselves to sit back and relax after last year's state title, according to their

"They've stayed pretty humble on everything, and focused on what their jobs are," head coach Warren Brenner said. "They took the complacency side of it and completely threw it away.

"If you're mentally not prepared, it can go sideways pretty quick."

True to form, Yankton's only loss this season came against top-ranked Rapid City Stevens. The Bucks closed the regular season with ties against Sioux Falls Lincoln and Pierre.

Brenner said it's probably a "good thing" that the Bucks are playing Pierre

Against the other seven teams that advanced to the state tournament, the Yankton Gazelles have scored at least one goal in every game — with the exception of Brookings, which they did not face.

The only question now is, how will Yankton's defense far on the state's biggest stage?

Eighth-seeded Yankton (4-6-0) opens with top-ranked Sioux Falls Roosevelt (10-0-0) at the South Dakota State High School Soccer Championships, which begins today

(Thursday) in Sioux Falls.

Winners of two straight, including last weekend's play-in game, the Gazelles own one of the three goals allowed by Roosevelt during the regular season.

'We've scored against the top-notch teams in the state, so we know we can do it," Yankton head coach Dave La-Combe said. "It's our defense

that needs to pull through. "If we can make no mistakes, that'll be the crucial part of the game.'

It has been a season of momentum swings for Yankton, which boasts only one senior on the roster this sea-

The Gazelles won their season opener, then lost three straight, went 1-2 in the middle stretch, then lost five straight and closed with consecutive wins entering the state tournament.

'We went through a long slump, with a lot of frustrations," LaCombe said. "We were trying to figure out formations and assignments to get us clicking. Finally to-ward the end we made some changes that seem to be working really well.'

In the first matchup between the two teams this season, Roosevelt rolled past

Bison Picked To Rule In Summit Men's Hoops; Jackrabbits 3rd

ELMHURST, Ill. — North Dakota State is the favorite to win the 2013-14 Summit League Basketball Championship according to the annual preseason poll of league coaches, SIDs and media. The Bison received 25-of-28 firstplace votes after finishing as runner-up at the 2012 Summit League Tournament. Head coach Saul Phillips returns all five starters and 11 of 12 letterwinners from last season's squad that finished 24-10 overall and 12-4 in Summit

League play. NDSU guard Taylor Braun, a two-time All-Summit League selection, was the preseason choice for Player of the Year. The senior averaged 15.4 points, 5.2 rebounds, 3.0 assists and 1.5 steals per game and scored in double-figures in 21 of 24 games played dur-

ing the 2012-13 season. League newcomer Denver, which earned a share of the 2012-13 WAC regular season title and posted a first-round NIT victory last March, earned the remaining three first-place votes to finish second in the poll with 260

South Dakota State, the two-time defending Summit League Tournament champion, placed third with 233 points. Last season's regular season co-champion, Western Illinois, was fourth in the voting. Omaha, Fort Wayne, South Dakota and IUPUI

rounded out the poll. Joining three NDSU players on the preseason All-Summit League first team are South Dakota State's Jordan Dykstra (12.5 ppg, 7.9 rpg).

Second-team selections included South Dakota's Trevor Gruis (12.3 ppg, 6.1 rpg).

Nov. 8 marks the beginning of the 2013-14 season and the 14-game double round-robin Summit League schedule starts Jan. 9. The 2014 Summit League Basketball Championships will be held March 8-11, the sixth consecutive year in Sioux

"We had a different theme in practice, and I tried to get things going. I'm hoping after this game they see where they should be playing so hopefully we can get some more of those GPAC wins."

The Mount Marty Lancers kept with the Northwestern Red Raiders, ranked fifth in the nation, in their Great Plains Athletic Conference match at the Laddie E. Cimpl Arena, ultimately coming up just short with scores of 25-20, 25-23 and 25-20.

Northwestern led the entire first game after taking an early 11-5 lead and kept it to stay ahead 22-14 and finish


