

Webcast To Cover End Of Life Care

This webcast is an opportunity for area health care professionals and clergy to hear an all-star panel of experts share important insights into how hospice professionals, funeral directors, members of the clergy and grief counselors can come together to support those at the end of life. Webcast participants will learn how each vocation has a specific role in serving client families and how collaborative efforts can provide a continuum of care at the end-of-life. SDCHIP Event Slated For Elk Point

PIERRE — Attorney General Marty Jackley and the South Dakota Masons want to remind parents and guardians of the upcoming South Dakota Child Identification Program (SD-CHIP) event: Elk Point Jefferson School, 402 South Douglas, Elk Point Monday, Oct. 21, from 4-8 p.m. and Tuesday, Oct. 22, from 4-8 p.m. SDCHIP is part of MASONICHIP, an initiative of the Masons of North American that generates completed packages of various identifying items of children for parents or guardians. The types of identification that are collected include: dental impressions, DNA cheek swab, digital still photo, fingerprints and video imaged interview. All of the identifying materials generated by the program are returned to the child's family to be kept as an identification kit in the event that a child becomes missing. This kit will aid law enforcement in the recovery of a missing child. The program is offered to the public at no charge. "SDCHIP is a comprehensive child identification program designed to assist in the event a child becomes missing," said Jackley. "The Masons should be commended not only for the creation of this important program, but the time put forth to volunteer and administer the program throughout South Dakota." Agencies who assist in the implementation of the program include: Masonship International, South Dakota Academy of Physician Assistants, South Dakota Sheriff's Association, South Dakota Dental Association, South Dakota Highway Patrol and the Attorney General's Office.

Tuesday, October 18, 1938
• Tractors battled through heavy snowdrifts today in an attempt to reach 15 civilian conservation corps enrollees atop Mount Willard in northern Utah. The snow fall ranged upward to three feet, with 10 foot drifts reported in many spots.
• Harlan J. Bushfield, republican candidate for governor, in an address here (Brookings) last night, declared the farm problem should be taken out of politics and "administered by the farmers themselves."

50 YEARS AGO

Friday, October 18, 1963
• "Merely because a boy makes a mistake does not mean that society will not forgive him. Society will lean over to help any boy who wants to be a good citizen." Atty. Gen. Frank Farrar recommended a firm disciplinary approach for juvenile law breakers, but tempered with mercy to those who prove they want to rehabilitate themselves.
• State health officials asked the help today of the public and businessmen in the location and removal from sale of a product called "X-33 Water Repellent." The Federal Food and Drug Administration notified the state health department that the product, a masonry water proofing agent, is extremely flammable.

• Area schools and public agencies will be eligible to claim some surplus items from the Yankton Federal Prison Camp Wednesday and Thursday. When the college closed in December 1984, most items were left in building as if the college were closed for a vacation.

The Braves didn't receive the kindest of greetings last Thursday night, dropping an 80-32 decision to Bonesteel-Fairfax in a rather belated season opener. But at least the Braves were there to play.

CHICAGO (AP) — Grain futures were mostly higher Thursday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

consistent with being from two different people. The bones have been sent to the University of North Texas for identification using DNA testing, he said. The results could help bring closure to the families and allow proper burials and also might yield further evidence, Jackley said. Vermillion High School students Cheryl Miller and Pamela Jackson, both 17, were last seen in the car on their way to a party at a nearby gravel pit. The car was found upside down in an embankment in Brule Creek in southeast South Dakota.
