# **Q&A: Coyote Freshman Receiver Donovan Becoming Deep Threat**

P&D: Did you have a sense that you could play this year? **Donovan:** Not really, no. It

was going into the fourth week, and (receivers) coach (Matthew) Middleton said. 'Hey, it's a 3-way battle between you guys' then later they said, 'Hey, you're starting.'

P&D: Was there a big adjustment for you mentally, going from a redshirt to a starter so quickly?

Donovan: It was huge, yeah. I had to get my mindset different. When you think you're redshirting, you don't even think about seeing the

field. When you're starting, it's, 'I better go hard every play.'

**P&D:** Coach Joe Glenn talked about your comfort with quarterback Kevin Earl, that it seems like you guys have a connection there. Do you?

Donovan: We threw quite a bit during the summer, so that helped me out quite a bit, seeing his ball and getting those routes figured out.

P&D: How about the idea of becoming a deep threat? **Donovan:** Last year they

had Will Powell. I'm not him yet, but that's where I want to be eventually.

P&D: When USD was recruiting you, did you think you could have this kind of impact?

Donovan: I didn't think anything of it, I just came in like everybody else. You just have to work for your spot.

The NFL began a Women Officiating Now (W.O.N.) program this year as part of the Football Officiating Academy launched in 2010. The program is designed to help recruit and train female

officials. Coleman said he had never seen more than one woman work a college game but did see two in a high school game.

Shannon Eastin of Tempe, Ariz., is the only woman to officiate in an NFL game. The Mid-Eastern Athletic Conference line judge moved up during the lockout last August for the preseason opener between Green Bay and San Diego.

Will there be women officiating in the NFL? Yes, there will be, because we're committed to having the best officials," Coleman said. "We're committed to having excellence in officiating at all levels. We're looking for the best officials. When we have women, just like when we have men who are in that group, they will go in that (development) program.

Coleman said Sarah Thomas of Mississippi is the only female among the 21 officials in the NFL's top-tier advanced development program officiating in major

college games. To get to the NFL as an official, you have to be in that group," he said. "That's our talent pool to come on the field when vacancies exist. She's doing very well in Conference USA and will be considered when (a spot) for line judge opens up."


