

S.D. State Cross Country loods, Kruse Seek Another 1-2 Finish For Gazelles

A year ago, Yankton's Savannah Woods and Annie Kruse became the first teammates in nearly 20 years to finish 1-2 in the S.D. Class AA Cross Country Meet.

The duo would like to do that again this year, though the order may be reversed.

Kruse, a senior, has been leading the way this season and is considered one of the favorites when the 2013 meet is held today (Saturday) at Robbinsdale Park in Rapid City. The meet was moved from The Elks Golf Course

in Rapid City due to storm damage from a blizzard earlier this month.

"Annie has got to be one of the favorites, she and Tamara Gorman (2010 champion) from Stevens," said Yankton head cross country coach Dave Dannenbring. "Nobody's been able to chase down either one, and they haven't raced against each other. It will be interesting to see them go head-to-head."

Woods, a sophomore and the defending state champ, wouldn't mind seeing another top-two sweep.

"Hopefully Annie and I take it to them and go 1-2 again," she said. The Gazelles also returned a pair of eighth graders — Tessa Folkers (57th) and Madison McClure (75th) — from last year's state meet roster. Senior Whitlee Larson, who finished 17th in 2009 and ninth in both 2010 and 2011, returns after missing the 2012 state meet due to injury.

Kruse, Larson and senior Abby Van Meeteren, who also made the state meet lineup, have provided steady leadership for the girls' squad, while seniors Brice Cowman, Justin Grode and Morgan Hill have been anchors for the boys, according to Dannenbring.

"Whenever you have a couple of good seniors, you're going to have a good season," he said. "And we have that with Annie, Whitlee and Abby for the girls, and Brice, Justin and Morgan for the boys.'

Junior Lauren Graves completes the girls' seven for state. Besides Cowman, who placed seventh, and Grode, who finished 46th last season, the Bucks return junior Paul Fanta (70th) from the 2012 state meet. Junior Kyle Bergeson, sophomores Andrew Peitz and Sam Gusso, and eighth grader Brady Jaquith round out the boys seven.

"It's been a great group that has stuck together as a team," Dannen-

Seven Class A and 11 Class B teams from southeast South Dakota will be represented when the South Dakota State Cross Country meet is held today (Saturday) at Robbinsdale Park in Rapid City. The event was moved from the Elks Golf Course in Rapid City due to storm damage.

The field includes the Parker boys, who will be aiming for a fourth consecutive Class B title despite the graduation of three-time individual champion Duane Jongeling. Also entered is defending Class B girls' champion Genevieve Clark of Gayville-Volin, and 2012 Class A girls' runner-up Madisen Lavin of Vermillion.

Competition begins at noon (Mountain Time) with the Class B girls' race, followed by the Class A girls' race, the Class B boys' race and the Class A boys' race. Awards for Class A and Class B will be at approximately 2:30 p.m. MT, following the Class AA girls' race. Girls' races are 4,000 meters, while boys' races are 5,000 meters.

Here is a look at area teams, listed by class and in alphabetical order.

Class B

Avon The Pirates will take one boy out west, senior Brant Blaha. Blaha competed at state a year ago nishing 49th

VERMILLION — All the Coyotes have left to do is win.

Having already ended its long drought in the Missouri Valley Football Conference and their 18-game road losing streak, the USD football team is suddenly near the top of the league standings following a 3-game win streak. "We needed it too, be-

cause we're trying to go to the playoffs," junior linebacker Auston Johnson said after practice this week.

That's our goal."

First comes the matter of kick-starting a season-ending gauntlet with a victory today (Saturday) at Illinois State in Normal, III. And if recent history is any indication, the Coyotes (4-3, 3-1) and Red-birds (3-4, 2-2) are in for a close battle.
