Dakota where she was an instructor, an assistant professor and an associate professor. In May, she formally retired from the university and has become professor emeritus for the USD Department of Nursing.

Among her accomplishments, Jorgensen has presented research in the Netherlands, received honors from both the USD School of Health Science and Department of Nursing for service and has taken students to Africa where they conducted a service-learning course in which they helped in schools — including a school for the deaf — and clinics. She was also the advisor for the Student Nurses Association and is an accreditation visitor for the Accreditation Commission for Education in Nursing.

She said she makes around 3-4 accreditation visits each year at campuses across the country.

Despite the distinguished career, Jorgensen said she believes the she was only doing her job.

"It's always been important for me to give back to the profession and provide a service," she said. "But I don't know that I even deserved it. There's a lot of nurses that do a lot more stuff than I do."

Other area award winners during the SDNA convention included Marcy Lund of Vermillion (Joy of Nursing Award) and Sister Sharon Ann Haas of Yankton (honored for contributions to SDNA and the nursing profession).

"Although most statehood anniversary activities will occur in 2014, these events will be a kickoff for next year's celebration," Gov. Daugaard said in a press release. "The people of Yankton fought hard for statehood 125 years ago and their enthusiasm is still alive and well today."

"This is the main that brings the raw water from the collector well back to the treatment facility," Goodman said. "This will also include the outfall pipe from the treatment facility to the river. The backwash from the membranes (that are used to treat the water) will have to be discharged back into the river."

Pilot testing on the major equipment being proposed for the plant is also projected to be complete next July.

"With the membranes, we'll pilot test them against our

water. It will basically prove that the process we're looking at works," Goodman said.

"After we get done with the pilot testing, we'll actually bid out and procure the membranes we're going to use. We'll purchase them before we build the treatment facility. We'll build around the membranes so they work for us."

Procurement of the equipment is projected for October 2014.

The collector well design is expected to be done next October, too.

"It looks like in August 2015 we should be ready to bid out construction of the new water treatment plant," Goodman said.

City Manager Amy Nelson and Commissioner David Knoff

encouraged the use of local civil engineers on the project when possible.

"Some of the surveying stuff has been contracted out to a local firm," Goodman said. "We'll continue to do that."

The \$1.99 million contract was approved in an 8-0 vote, with Commissioner Brad Wornier abstaining.

In other business Monday, the commission agreed to provide the Yankton County Historical Society with \$25,000 for its Mead Building restoration project.

The non-profit organization had sought \$50,000 from the city.

Mead Building Committee member Jim Means said the money would be leveraged to secure more funds for the proj-

ect. In part, the city's contribution will be used to show local commitment to the undertaking when applying for grants, he stated.

Mixed feelings were expressed by commission members as the agenda item was discussed.

Knoff said he felt the commission should discuss its long-term plans for supporting the Mead Building project before contributing a small portion of the estimated \$5 million it will take to complete the restoration of the historic building for use as a museum and cultural center.

However, Commissioner Craig Sommer said that if such a small contribution (compared to the total price tag) could help what he believes is an impor-

tant project succeed, the city should make that commitment.

Ultimately, Commissioner Charlie Gross suggested awarding \$25,000 now, with the expectation that the Historical Society could come back and ask for the other \$25,000 next year.

The measure passed with a unanimous vote.

Also Monday, the commission got a presentation from Nelson about the annual community survey conducted by the city and discussed various portions of a proposed animal ordinance that is slated for final approval Nov. 11.
