Williams said he has occasionally been accused of supplying the voices heard on recordings, but reassures users he did no such thing.

"The funniest response that I get is occasionally people accuse me of putting fake sounds into the recordings," he said. "I just tell them the app does what it says it does and people are going to take that the way they want to

take it."

Williams, who is now based in Seattle, said he hasn't personally detected anything abnormal using the app. He added that he finds himself in between being a believer and a skeptic.

"I think it's possible things are out there," he said. "I'm a skeptic, but I could be (convinced), and I'm hoping that maybe I'll find some evidence and push
