The Irene native had no serious visions of making an immediate impact on the field for the Tigers.

Little did he know, Livingston and a number of other South Dakota products — would become a starter sooner than expected.

Larson is tied for the team lead with 13 receptions, while Livingston has nine catches for 66 yards. Jared

Van Winkle has made 23 tackles on defense with one interception and Kiger has recorded two sacks. Bloch is a starter on the offensive line.

And it's not just kids from the area making an impact in Mitchell. Ten of the 11 defensive starters hail from South Dakota, as do up to eight on of-

NFAA To Host **Outdoor Target** Championships Here Beginning On Saturday

The National Field Archery Association is going back to its roots.

Founded in 1939, the Yankton-based organization is well known for its field and 3D tournaments, but is reaching back to the past when target archery was the popular discipline.

Past is about to meet the present this weekend.

The NFAA will host the inaugural Outdoor National Target Championships on Saturday and Sunday at Easton Field in Yankton.

We've got a huge group of target archers that have been looking for a tournament like this," NFAA president Bruce Cull said.

The combination of increased interest in target archery — a stationary and therefore more spectatorfriendly variety — and the available facilities in Yankton made for an obvious fit, according to Cull.

"It was a natural for our organization to look at this," he said.

Archers will shot an NFAA 900 round on Saturday, which consists of 90 arrows shot at three different distances 30 at each distance.

Sunday's final round will be an NFÁA 600 round, which includes 60 arrows shot at the three distances, but in reverse order and at a smaller paper target.

The variety is exactly what Danielle Herrlein was looking for.

Herrlein, a 14-year-old archer from Yankton, said she jumped at the opportunity to try something she's not all that familiar with.

"This is the last chance I'll get to shoot distances this year," Herrlein said. "We see these same targets every day. so it's nice to have distances at three different ones."

In all, the NFAA expects just over 100 archers present, according to Cull.

'Whatever we got was going to be one hundred percent more than we've ever had," he added with a smile.

It's nothing like the Vegas shoot or some of the other national tournaments, but it's a great start," he said. "And it's something our members

Even if the tournament is only two days in length, Herrlein said. She competed in a national and international field tournament that were

The Mount Marty College men's soccer team was excited after their Great Plains Athletic Conference victory over Morningside on Wednesday at Easton Field. It was understandable:

None of them had experienced a GPAC win before.

Genaro Bustillos scored both goals as MMC beat Morningside 2-1, ending a 33match GPAC losing streak for the Lancer program. The Lancers had last won a league match Oct. 27, 2010, also with a 2-1 victory over Morningside.

'That was one of the best 90s from the boys this year,' said Mount Marty College soccer coach Nathan Epp, referring to a full match. "They've played better at times, but this was the most

complete match." Mount Marty held a 19-16 edge in shots, including a 9-5 edge in shots on goal. Humberto Estrada needed to make three saves for the Lancer win. Eduardo Pinheiro made seven saves for the Mustangs.

A more aggressive approach was key for the Lancers, acccording to junior midfielder Ludwin Arana, who finished with five shots,

The rematch of Mount Marty College's first-ever Great Plains Athletic Conference women's soccer playoff match did not go as well as last season's post-season

Morningside jumped out to a 2-0 halftime lead and coasted to a 5-1 victory over the Lancers in GPAC action on Wednesday at Easton Field.

The victory was the first of the conference season for Morningside (3-7-1, 1-2 GPAC), the conference regular season champs a year ago. MMC dropped to 2-7-1 overall, 0-3 in league play.

"We are struggling right now," said MMC coach Nathan Epp. "We aren't playing well, and it's affecting us mentally.

Morningside got on the board just 4:37 into the match, when Kensly Schuelke connected with Amy Samuelson for a score. Ten minutes later, Breanna Van Bochove found Amy Grause on a run

for a 2-0 Mustang lead. The Lancers settled down after that and kept the margin at two at the half.

Mount Marty came out with a strong start in the second half, just missing one scoring chance before Annabelle Martin stole the ball in front of the goal and pounded it home.

But the excitement was short-lived, as Samuelson put away a Kristina Sorenson pass to answer that goal in just 69 seconds. Sorenson and Mattie Rabon added goals late to ice the victory. Marti Hitz and Hope Forman assisted on the final two Mustang goals.

Morningside finished with a 24-5 edge in shots, including a 13-3 margin in shots on goal.

"As a team we need to find our aggressiveness," Epp said. "We need to be confident and play with that confidence when games come.'

Epp admitted that back-to-back double-overtime losses could still be affecting the team.

"We'd come so close in the early part of the season," he said. "What we need to understand is that, no matter the situation, we have to play hard. Right now we aren't."

The Lancers host another team looking for its first GPAC win, Doane (2-6-1, 0-2-1 GPAC), on Saturday. The match will be played at 4 p.m. at Lewis & Clark Soccer Park, as Easton Field will be hosting an archery tournament.
