

Earl Returns As Coyotes Host UNI For Homecoming

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VERMILLION — After five games, Kevin Earl is back under center at the University of South Dakota.

Five games and six weeks and one broken thumb later, the junior quarterback will return for the Coyotes, who host No. 21-ranked Northern Iowa for today's (Saturday) 3 p.m. homecoming game at the Dakota-

"It seems like forever since I've been out there," Earl said after a practice this week. "It's nice to be able to

get rid of some of the rust." Earl broke a bone in his right thumb after slamming it against a helmet in the season opener at Oregon. His backup, Ryan Saeger, started the next five games, leading the Coyotes to a 2-2 record.

Even with that much time away

from game action, Earl maintained this week that his timing and accuracy feel crisp — all with little to no pain in his right hand.

"I've always had a pretty good feel with our receivers," he said. "It doesn't really take too long to get back on the same page with them.

Though the Coyotes boast a potent rushing attack that averages 214 yards a game, the receivers are anxious to have their offensive leader

"It's nice to have him back," sophomore Riley Donovan said. "It's a whole new energy on the field.'

It's one thing to be back on the field after an injury, but it's another obstacle to suddenly be throwing the ball 75 times each practice, head coach Joe Glenn said.

"He's gripping and ripping," the coach said. "He's probably not used to practicing and throwing the ball

that many times."

The timing of Earl's return is fitting, given the opponent.

Against Northern Iowa last season, Earl passed for 370 yards and three touchdowns as the Coyotes scored a double-overtime upset win in Cedar

"He took the game over, he did an outstanding job last year," UNI head coach Mark Farley said this week. "So I'm sure he's looking forward to it. We'll just have to play better.'

Ditto for the Coyotes.

A week ago at Southern Illinois in the Missouri Valley opener, USD was out-scored 31-0 after halftime on the way to a 31-point loss.

That's been a focus for the Coyotes this week: Playing a full four quarters.

Jacobs, a junior defensive tackle, was medically cleared Wednesday and will see his first action of the season today (Saturday) when the Coyotes host No. 21 Northern Iowa.

"I always knew I would come

through," Jacobs said after Wednesday's practice, his first since Aug. 17. "I never lost faith or lost hope.

A two-year starter on the line for the Coyotes (2-3), Jacobs developed an infection in his esophagus during pre-season practices and soon had ulcers. He found it difficult to swallow food, which prompted a weight loss.

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Bucks Blast Coyotes Blank WIU 3-0 Govs 37-0 From P&D Staff Reports

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VERMILLION — Conference win No. 6 against zero losses required the University of South Dakota volleyball team to showcase a rarely-needed trait. Resiliency.

The first-place Coyotes were able to overcome some early frustrations to pick up a Summit League sweep over Western Illinois by scores of 25-23, 25-22, 25-16 on Friday night at the DakotaDome.

Faced with a road trip to unbeaten Denver on Sunday, the Coyotes (12-6 overall) started 6-0 in league play for the second consecutive season. The latest occurrence was far from easy, though.

"It's nice to know we can do that, but we can't do this every time," said senior Kendall Kritenbrink, who had a match-high 14 kills.

'We can't play like that against Denver.

A scrappy defense by the Leathernecks (3-15, 1-4) frustrated the Coyotes in the first two sets, but in-match adjustments — namely keeping at it

kept USD in front. "That's a testament to what this team is growing into, they're able to learn from mistakes pretty quickly," head coach Leanne

Williamson said. In the opening set, the Coyotes still out-hit the Leathernecks, but weren't exactly ever in control — as the hosts saw the majority of their swings find WIU defen-

sive targets. They probably pissed off our hitters, probably had them thinking, 'How did you get that?,'" Williamson said.

It was much the same story in set two, but even with a 2-0 lead, the Coyotes had to dig deep during the break, according to freshman setter Brittany Jessen.

"We just had to be ready to play multiple balls in a rally, hit a few more times at them," said Jessen, who finished with 32 set assists. "It's great to make the changes as quick as we did.

Junior Sydney Dimke finished the match with 11 kills for USD, while senior Melissa Firtko had seven kills and six total blocks. Sophomore Audrey Reeg led the defense with 16 digs.
