The Mount Marty Lancers found the Johnson and Wales University Wildcats to be less than gracious visitors Sunday afternoon.

The non-conference Wildcats came out pushing and shoving, only to find the Lancers were willing to push back, but Johnson and Wales were able to parlay the physical style of play into a 2-1 victory at Easton Field.

'Overall, I was pretty pleased with the energy and effort; I saw the toughness, Mount Marty head coach Nathan Epp said of a game that saw six vellow cards. "I thought that's been missing a little bit at times this year.

'We've been trying to get them to play scrappy because I've known all along that we have it in us," Epp added.
