Leischner, Paulsen **Take Different Routes** To Top Of Region 3A

VERMILLION — Lexy Leischner and Hunter Paulsen took different routes to their region championships.

One (Leischner, an eighth-grader for Ethan-Parkston) snuck up on the field, while the other (Paulsen, a senior at Elk Point-Jefferson) came through as the expected medalist.

They each, though, battled the wind on the way to their titles at the Region 3A cross country meet on Wednesday at the University of South Dakota course in Vermillion.

"I thought it'd be harder because of the wind, but it wasn't as bad as you think," said Leischner, who won the girls' race in a time of

The biggest challenge, of course, was running into the wind, she said.

"You just had to dig in and wait for the wind to get behind you," Leischner said.

And for all but the first 1,000 meters of the

4K course, Leischner had nobody behind her. She passed Vermillion's Maddie Lavin and led for the remainder of the race.

I didn't expect this," Leischner said. "I was just hoping to be top four."

Thanks to that first-place clocking, Ethan-Parkston was able to capture the team championship with 28 points. The Trojans had three other runners in the top 11 — Sydney Wicker sham seventh (16:09.62), Taya Heisinger ninth (16:20.11) and Patience Nesheim 11th

Canton and Beresford finished second and third, respectively, to also qualify for the South Dakota state meet on Oct. 25 in Huron.

The boys' race went about as expected, as Paulsen beat the field for first place.

"I knew there was some good competition, so I just had to run my race and see how it went," he said later.

How it went was simple: Paulsen controlled the 5.000-meter race.

He finished first with a time of 17:12.24, well in front of Sioux Falls Christian's Caleb De Weerd (17:47.20) — who was then 13 seconds ahead of third place.

Winning a region title a year after taking third was particularly sweet for Paulsen, a sen-

"It means more, yeah," he said. "You always want to go out with a bang.

Sioux Falls Christian won the boys' team crown, with 27 points, while Lennox (31) and Ethan-Parkston (57) also qualified their teams

One of the top storylines of the meet came in the girls' race, where Vermillion's Lavin the defending Class A state champion — battled to a fifth-place finish despite suffering from a sore left ankle.

Lavin said she sprained the ankle during a training run on Wednesday, to the point where she says she heard a snap.

'It felt better than yesterday, that's for sure," Lavin said. "But I could still feel it." Though she was in the lead for the first

place finish, according to Crofton coach Jason Arens.


