league talent, Wil Myers, and a bevy of other promising prospects to the Rays. They were mortgaging their future to win in the present.

The trade paid immediate dividends. Shields went 13-9 with a 3.15 ERA last year, helping the Royals to their best record in more than 20 years. And over the course of the season, Davis established himself as one of the most dominant late-inning relievers in the game.

This year, Shields has gone 14-8 with a 3.21 ERA, helping the Royals not only return to the postseason for the first time in 29 years but advance all the way to the Fall Classic.

He started their wild-card win over Oakland. He allowed two runs over six innings in earning the win in a divisional game against the Angels. And he was good enough to help the Royals knock off Baltimore in the ALCS, running their postseason winning streak to 11 games.

"He's earned the nickname Big Game James for a reason," Royals manager Ned Yost said.

On a team with precious few veterans, Shields has proved invaluable in October. And when he takes the mound against the Giants, he'll be drawing on the experience he gained in 2008, when he tossed 5 2-3 innings for the Rays against the

Phillies in the only other World Series start of his nine-year big league career.

"He's been tremendous," said Greg Holland, the Royals' All-Star closer. "He takes that starting five as kind of collectively, 'Hey, we want to be the backbone of this team. We want to throw 200 innings apiece. We want to push each other, learn from each other.'

"I think he also leads by example, taking the ball every five days and giving his heart and soul," Holland said. "I think once you start rattling off good start after good start, it kind of builds on itself. You want to do just as good as the guy in front of you did."

Shields, however, does more than put up solid numbers. He keeps the clubhouse jovial between games and ratchets up the intensity when it's time to compete. Once he's on the mound, he stalks around like a lion, often roaring as he heads back to the dugout after a big strikeout.

His teammates took notice, adopting many of his mannerisms. "I just try to be myself and hopefully it's contagious," Shields said. "That's about it. I mean, I have fun with this game. I feel like I'm a grinder. I feel like I have a winning attitude, so hopefully it feeds off these guys, and we have

fun with it. We're all little kids at heart." Shields is a free agent after this season, and few expect him to re-sign with the small-market Royals. Clubs with far bigger budgets figure to drive up the bidding to the point that Moore is forced to bow out of the negotiations. All of that is for later, though. Shields is too busy with the present, trying to win a World Series ring, to worry about any of it. "Obviously we understand the magnitude of what's going on in Kansas City," he said. "We're going to go out there and play our game and trust our ability to win ball-games."

Manning Passes Favre With 509th Career TD Pass

DENVER (AP) — Peyton Manning broke Brett Favre's NFL record for touchdown passes with his 509th.

The record-breaker was an 8-yarder to Demaryius Thomas with 3:09 left in the first half that gave Denver a 21-3 lead over San Francisco on Sunday night.

Manning's receivers played keep-away with the milestone memento before Manning got the ball and congratulations from his teammates.

Favre sent along his congratulations via a scoreboard video he taped from his home in Hattiesburg, Mississippi. Manning went into the game with 506 and needed just four drives to break Favre's record.

He threw a 3-yard TD pass to Emmanuel Sanders on Denver's first drive and tied the record when Wes Welker took a pass over the middle for 39 yards. Sanders' score was his first in Denver, and he became the 47th player to catch a TD pass from Manning. Manning reached the milestone in his 246th regular-season game. Favre needed 302. As Manning approached the milestone, Favre told The Associated Press he was thrilled "it's Peyton that's doing it. I think a lot of Peyton. I know him well. I know his family well. His dad was one of my idols."

(AP) — Carson Wentz passed for two touchdowns, John Crockett ran for two more Saturday and North Dakota State beat Indiana State 34-17, extending its winning streak to 31 games and conference win-streak to 16 games. Wentz was a career-high 20 for 30 for 222, with TD passes of 48 and 5 yards to Zach Vizaz, who grabbed a career-high nine catches for 119 yards. Crockett gained 101 yards on 20 carries, with TD runs of 2 and 3 yards. Adam Keller kicked a 19-yard field goal and a career-long 50-yarder. The Bison (7-0, 3-0 Missouri Valley) outgained the Sycamores 431-227 and led 20-3 at halftime. Indiana State (4-3, 1-2), the last team to beat the Bison, 17-14 on Oct. 13, 2012, scored on an 18-yard TD pass from Mike Perish to A.J. Johnson in the fourth quarter and a 72-yard TD run by Jor-

dan Wallace after recovering a fumble. **ILLINOIS ST. 37, W ILLINOIS 34;** MACOMB, Ill. (AP) — Ter Roberson accounted for four second-half touchdowns and Nick Aussieker kicked a 34-yard field goal as time expired, rallying Illinois State past Western Illinois 37-34 on Saturday.

The Redbirds (6-4, 3-0 Missouri Valley) faced a 27-6 deficit late in the third quarter, but stormed back as Roberson threw touchdown passes of 10 and 9 yards to James O'Shaughnessy and scored on a 64-yard run in between plays at 27.

Western Illinois (3-5, 1-3) responded with a 75-yard strike from Trenton Norvell to Lance Lenor, but Illinois State once again answered with a 24-yard touchdown from Roberson to Cameron Meredith with 7:53 remaining.

Norvell drove the Leathernecks past midfield, but was intercepted by David Perkins with 2:28 left. A third-down completion from Roberson to Anthony Warrum set up Aussieker's game-winner. Marshawn Coprich had 114 yards rushing with a 69-yard touchdown.

Lenor had 195 yards on 12 receptions with two scores.

YOUNGSTOWN STATE 26, SOUTHERN ILLINOIS 14; YOUNGSTOWN, Oh. (AP) — Jody Webb scored two rushing touchdowns to lead Youngstown State to a 26-14 win over Southern Illinois Saturday.

Webb ran in a 9-yard touchdown with 8:31 remaining to give Youngstown State the two-score lead. Youngstown State mounted a 13-play, 72-yard drive, lasting the final 6:59, to secure the win. Webb ran 11 times for 88 yards and two scores and Hunter Wells threw for 265 yards and a touchdown on 21-of-28 passing for Youngstown State (5-2, 2-1 Missouri Valley). Webb's 19-yard touchdown gave Youngstown State a 17-0 halftime lead.

Mark Iannotti threw two touchdown passes in the third quarter for Southern Illinois (5-3, 2-2),

highlighted by a 62-yarder to Tay Willis. MyCole Pruitt's 2-yard touchdown reception pulled Southern Illinois within 20-14 with 1:53 remaining in the third.

Iannotti completed 12 of 22 passes for 139 yards and Willis finished with four catches for 97 yards.

NO. 19 NEBRASKA 38, NORTHWESTERN 17; EVANSTON, Ill. (AP) — Ameer Abdullah had four 1-yard touchdowns runs and quarterback Tommy Armstrong Jr. scored on a 16-yard reception, leading No. 19 Nebraska to a 38-17 victory at Northwestern on Saturday night.

Abdullah finished with 146 yards on 23 carries as the Cornhuskers (6-1, 2-1 Big Ten) bounced back from a 27-22 loss at Michigan State. Abdullah had only 45 yards in the loss to the Spartans on Oct. 4.

Northwestern (3-4, 2-2) wasted another big game for freshman Justin Jackson in its second consecutive loss. Jackson had 128 yards and two touchdowns in his third straight 100-yard game.

The Wildcats got a scare in the third quarter when receiver Miles Shuler had his head down when he slammed into Nebraska safety Corey Cooper after a short reception. Shuler held up his right arm to acknowledge the cheers as he was taken off the field on a stretcher. The school said he was taken to a hospital as a precaution.

MINNESOTA 39, PURDUE 38; MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — David Cobb rushed for 194 yards and a touchdown and Ryan Santos kicked a 52-yard field goal with 4:59 left to cap Minnesota's comeback on Saturday, giving the Gophers a 39-38 victory over Purdue and their first 3-0 start in Big Ten play since 1990.

Cedric Thompson had two interceptions for Minnesota (6-1, 3-0), including a diving pickoff of Austin Appleby with 2:28 remaining to seal it. This was the first time in 23 games under coach Jerry Kill that the Gophers rallied from a halftime deficit

to win. Appleby threw three first-half touchdown passes for the Boilemakers (3-5, 1-3), but he was only 4 for 10 for 18 yards in the second half. Raheim Mostert rushed for 115 yards in five carries and Akeem Hunt added 98 yards on 17 attempts, but Purdue's bid to spoil the 100th homecoming at Minnesota fell excruciatingly short.

MARYLAND 38, IOWA 31; COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP) — Will Likely returned an interception 45 yards for a fourth-quarter touchdown, and Maryland rallied from an early 14-point deficit to beat Iowa 38-31 Saturday for its first Big Ten home victory.

The Terrapins (5-2, 2-1) scored 24 straight points after falling behind by two touchdowns with 8:12 minutes elapsed. It was 24-21 before Likely picked off a Jake Rudock pass and sprinted untouched into the end zone with 12:29 left.

Slefon Diggs caught nine passes for 130 yards and a touchdown for Maryland, playing his first season in the Big Ten after leaving the Atlantic Coast Conference. The Terrapins are now 1-1 at home in league play after losing 52-24 to Ohio State two weeks ago.

Iowa (5-2, 2-1) committed three turnovers, sputtered offensively after its quick start and had its three-game winning streak end. Rudock went 32 for 56 for 317 yards and two touchdowns.

TEXAS 48, IOWA STATE 45; AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Nick Rose kicked a 21-yard field goal with 3 seconds left, sending Texas to a wild 48-45 victory over Iowa State, snapping a two-game losing streak in what had been the worst start for the Longhorns in nearly 60 years.

Iowa State had tied it 45-45 with 28 seconds left on E.J. Bibbs' second touchdown catch. Texas quarterback Tyrone Swoopes then threw two long passes to Jason Shipley and John Harris to set up Rose's winning kick.

Texas (3-4, 2-2 Big 12) first had to see Harris' sideline catch would hold up under review. Once confirmed, Texas sent out Rose rather than run another play.

Swoopes passed for 321 yards and also ran for 95 yards and a touchdown. Sam Richardson passed for 345 yards for Iowa State (2-5, 0-4). The teams combined for more than 1,000 yards total offense.

Texas' 2-4 start was its worst since 1956. **DRAKE 17, VALPARAISO 9;** VALPARAISO, Ind. (AP) — Quarterback Andy Rice scored on a 1-yard run in the fourth quarter and Drew Ormsett later sealed it with an interception return for a touchdown, giving Drake a 17-9 win over Valparaiso Saturday.

Drake (4-3, 3-1 Pioneer) erased a 9-0 deficit, pushing ahead 10-9 on Rice's run, capping a 14-play, 79-yard drive. Valparaiso (2-5, 0-3) then forced two punts and blocked a field goal, getting the ball back with 2:04 left. Scott Staal was picked off five plays later by Ormsett, who returned it 39 yards for the score. The Crusaders had one more chance with 44 seconds remaining, but Brad Duwe intercepted Staal's second-down pass to end it.

Rice threw for 265 yards with two interceptions and Michael Hudson had 93 yards on eight receptions. Staal threw for 52 yards in relief of the injured Ben Lehman, who threw an 8-yard touchdown to Ryan Shea for a 6-0 lead.
