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he said that they are surprised because we have some smaller children and younger people in the group," Allen said. "They don't expect the kind of professionalism that we offer. Everybody enjoys the music."

The lifestyle of the Allen Family has caught the attention of the TLC television network, which decided to climb aboard and make their lives a new special called "Home Sweet Bus" which will air on Oct. 28.

Viewers across the country will get an inside look the lives of Todd and Michelle, their five sons, three daughters, one daughter-in-law and twin toddler grandchildren on a 360-square-foot bus.

2. What experiences do you feel have prepared you for the position?

I've previously served six years on the Yankton School Board; I served in the South Dakota House of Representatives 10 years; I served in the State Senate for eight years. While in the Legislature I served on numerous committees. I was also appointed to the Corrections Commission and served as chairman of that group for several years. I was also appointed to a task force set up by former Gov. Bill Janklow to study criminal justice and the prison system and to bring reforms. I was appointed to a task force to study local government to find ways to share services and cut costs. I feel that this experience and leadership qualifies me as a knowledgeable

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last spring. "I was invited to go through these classes and learn about what goes on in the police department and sheriff's department," she said. "Just the day-to-day stuff, a lot of it related to the drug and alcohol arrests. After going through that, I started thinking about what can we do as a community. I decided after school started that I would get a hold of the principals of the middle school and the high school and the police and sheriff's department to find out what we could do. From there, we had a meeting and decide as a group to do a collective program of a Red Ribbon Rally."

According to Akland, Red Ribbon Week was created in response to the murder of DEA Agent Enrique Camarena.

Camarena was a Drug Enforcement Administration agent (DEA) who was tortured and killed in Mexico in 1985. When he decided to join the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration, his mother tried to talk him out of it. "I'm only one person," he told her, "but I want to make a difference."

"(On Feb. 7, 1985) he was reporting in and was captured by five gentlemen who severely tortured him and

then killed him and buried him in a shallow grave so he would be found as a message," Akland said. "How this began was his family members, friends and coworkers formed a Camarena club, and then later on it became nationwide. The red ribbons were worn in memory of him."

Akland said the thing that stands out about Camarena's story is that all he wanted to do was make a difference in even one life.

"When I read that story, it just stuck in my mind," she said. "It is also important that it ties in with Make a Difference Day. He wanted to make a difference. Red Ribbon Week was actually moved to October to tie in with Make a Difference Day, because he wanted to make a difference."

The Yankton Red Ribbon Rally will feature Yankton Middle School principal Todd Dvoracek, High School Principal Jennifer Johnke, the Yankton Police Department featuring Officer Jason Foote and Pat Nolz with the Canine units, the Yankton County Sheriff's Department and the Federal Prison camp (FPC).

Perhaps more importantly, Akland said, attendees will hear the stories of two men from the Choices

ministry. They have also performed in Jamaica, Guatemala, Zambia and Uganda.

"We felt God calling us to one special place. This place is in Uganda," Allen recalled. "We have a lot of progressive work going on there."

The Allen Family ministry has purchased a plot of land for the construction of a children's village in the area of Soroti, Uganda.

"We have been going there for three years and are leading more teams of people now," Allen said. "We are preparing for the fourth year right now. Our biggest project yet is building a children's village for orphans."

Allen said that orphans were supposed to move in months ago, but the Uganda government has slowed down the process.

"They keep telling us 'One more thing here. And one more thing there.' We are very close to having these orphans move in," he said.

The family needs \$15,000 to finish funding the first orphanage building, which will

knows, but it isn't always easy. "It does get frustrating sometimes on the bus. But we have learned to kind of move on from frustrating situations," Allen said. "When living on the bus, you have to learn to live with less. We didn't have to learn anything new because we pretty much all grew up that way. It's really just what we are used to. Whenever we have a place where we can just spread out, it kind of feels foreign. It's just like, 'What do I do with all this space?'"

The Allen Family has performed in more than 35 states and four Canadian provinces in full-time Gospel music

group at the FPC. "The Choices group is a group of inmates that go out into the community and tell their stories," she explained. "We decided to include the FPC and bring in two of the prisoners who have told their stories to other groups, because we felt it was important for them to share with the parents and students how they ended up being in the position they are in - being incarcerated in the Federal Prison Camp."

Akland hopes that the impact on the community of hearing their stories will be huge.

"Their stories will give awareness to the community, to the parents and to the students just how quickly things can happen," she said. "(They tell) how quickly you can get from being a good citizen or good student to ending up in a situation like they are in - incarcerated for drug abuse."

Akland said she knows that there are a lot of community events going on Tuesday evening, but she encourages the community to choose to be involved with the Red Ribbon Rally.

"This is a beginning for us," she said. "The way I look at it is, if we can help one person, one family or one family member, then it is a success."

house 12 children. "The land we have purchased can support 25 buildings. Once fully completed, this village will support 300 children," Allen said.

To help fund their efforts, the family came up with a program called "Buy A Brick-Save A Child."

"People can buy a brick for \$100 to fund the first of many structures we are building in Uganda," Allen said. "We write the name or the name of a loved one who bought a brick on a wall in our first building."

Allen said that this will be encouraging reminder to the orphans that there are people on the other side of the world who love them.

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more questions will be answered "in the days ahead."

EB-5 is a federal program that allows people from other nations to receive permanent visas for them and their families to live in the United States, if they invest at least \$500,000 apiece for the creation or preservation of at least 10 direct or indirect jobs. Rounds didn't directly answer the question of whether EB-5 should be continued, overhauled or shut down.

Rounds indicated there are changes that he could attempt if elected to the Senate. He didn't say what those might be. He turned his answer into an attack on big government. He also pointed out that past members of Congress from South Dakota voted for the program.

During the rebuttal time, Rounds said: "Has it been good for South Dakota? Yes, I believe it has."

Former Republican U.S. Sen. Larry Pressler, who is running as an independent, said the problem isn't the program.

"Support for the program doesn't mean we supported the corruption that surrounded it in South Dakota," Pressler said.

The four men took turns lashing at most or all of the current leadership in Washington, D.C.

Rounds repeatedly played on the low popularity of President Barack Obama, a Democrat, and referred to the president's "failed policies."

Rounds said a vote for two of his opponents — Pressler and Weiland — would be a vote for Obama's agenda.

Weiland said the U.S. Senate's two leaders — Democrat Harry Reid of Nevada and Republican Mitch McConnell of Kentucky — have given the

nation "the most dysfunctional government."

"I believe they have both failed this country greatly. It's time for new leadership," Weiland said.

He called on Rounds to also say he wouldn't support their return as the Senate's leaders. Rounds only joked that Weiland was right — he wouldn't vote for Reid as majority leader.

Pressler called for ending "the poisonous dispute" and said, "South Dakota needs a powerful senator."

Pressler predicted there could be four independents elected to the Senate this November and they would be in a strong position as "a center force" between the two major parties.

Howie said most South Dakotans are disappointed in leadership in both parties in Washington, and their partisan rancor is now blasting into South Dakota in advertising in the Senate contest. Howie said McConnell

shouldn't be returned as Republican Senate leader and he would stand with Texas U.S. Sen. Ted Cruz instead.

"South Dakota deserves something different," Howie said. "More of the same doesn't take us in the right direction."

Howie said several times that Congress would begin setting priorities if a lid was put on spending and cap was put on the deficit.

Pressler said he would be willing to work with Obama who has two more years left as president.

"I am capable of walking into his office and talking about South Dakota projects," Pressler said. He added that he is a friend of Mitt Romney, the Republican whom Obama beat for the presidency in 2012.

"That's why I'm running, because you can be friends with both sides and work with both sides," Pressler said.
