will. I have initiated a number of new ideas, and I bring a  $\,$ great deal of legislative knowledge to the table that is valuable in the operations of county government

## 2. What experiences do ou feel have prepared you for the position?

I'e previously served six years on the Yankton School Board; I served in the South Dakota House of Representatives 10 years. I served in the State Senate for eight years. While in the Legislature I served on numerous committees. I was also appointed to the Corrections Commission and served as chairman of that group for several years. I was also appointed to a task force set up by former Gov. Bill Janklow to study criminal iustice and the prison system and to bring reforms. I was appointed to a task force to study local government to find ways to share services and cut costs. I feel that this experience and leadership qualifies me as a knowledgeable

individual who can put these experiences to work for Yankton County.

3. What do you think the biggest issue is at the county level and how would you address it?

Our biggest issues now are roads, bridges and infrastructure, along with keeping up with technology. We have created a C-CRIPTT Fund (countycapital road improvement plan to transportation) to assist with roads and bridges, more needs to be done. The county staff has been tremendous with technology and we need to be continually vigilant of that. Of course government at the local level must also continue to serve, protect, and provide for those who are

unable to do so themselves. 4. How do commissioners balance the needs of a growing city (Yankton) while also addressing the needs of smaller communi-

ties throughout the county? The city of Yankton and the County are autonomous, with the city having many more sources of revenue than the county. That being said we have worked together in the past on a number of roads that are shared and we will continue to do that. We share

some snow plowing, library services, airport, the Center, ambulance, emergency management resources, law enforcement, the safety center. and rural fire resources when needed within the city, just to name a few things we help the city with. We need more communication with the other communities in the county to make them more resilient and attractive to legitimate developers.

## 5. What are your thoughts on the Napa Junction project and how it unfolded?

NAPA unfolded poorly, with too many people involved who could not keep quit until it was negotiated. Some have said the county needs to be courageous and take risks, something they know will not and cannot work. I know that the taxpayers say be smart and limit collateraľ risk. You limit casualties and collateral risk by being smart. There are far too many people with secondhand information that is neither factual nor scientific that are attempting to push something the developer wasn't really ready to bring forward, even after the commission unanimously approved a

re-zone and conditional use permit. The same thing is hap pening with the developer in Bon Homme County now. We need legitimate, serious developers, not people who make demands and refuse to negotiate.

We need to develop our infrastructure, (roads, bridges, ect.) first. Until that is done it will be increasingly difficult to get commerce into the rural communities and areas of this county. In doing so we cannot break the bank and the taxpayer, there will certainly be sacrifices that will need to be
