Assistive Technology Training **Available For South Dakotans** Who Are Blind, Visually Impaired

PIERRE — South Dakota is offering free training on accessing mobile devices and personal computers for citizens with vision loss beginning this month (October).

The S.D. Department of Human Services (DHS), Division of Service to the Blind and Visually Impaired (SBVI), will provide instruction to address built-in accessibility options in personal computing devices. Adults and high school students with low vision or who are blind are eligible for the free individualized training with up to five hours of instruction per program participant.

Using technology to access and share information is an important part of dayto-day life in 2014, and nearly all jobs require the use of computers or mobile devices of some kind," DHS Secretary Gloria Pearson said. "Assistive technology training is a vital part of maintaining a high quality of life, including competitive

employment, for South Dakotans who are blind or visually impaired."

The intent of SBVI's access-training project is to help people with vision loss maximize their ability to use their mobile devices and computers. No devices, applications or software will be purchased through the

program. "We believe the specific, individualized nature of the instruction will be a key to the successful training of each participant as well as the project overall," SBVI Director Gaye Mattke said. "Training may include topics such as utilizing built-in accessibility features, downloading apps and accessing everything from the Internet and email to other existing applications.'

PIERRE — The state health department will actively monitor travelers who enter South Dakota from Ebola-affected countries under new measures announced by the CDC, a state health official said today.

All travelers who enter the U.S. from Liberia, Sierra Leone and Guinea, the three countries most affected by the Ebola outbreak, through five major airports in the country are screened for Ebola symptoms," said Secretary of Health Doneen Hollingsworth. "Low-risk travelers without symptoms can continue on. CDC then notifies destination states so the individuals can be monitored for 21 days, the longest time it can take from when a person is exposed to Ebola virus until symptoms can develop. We're prepared to do that monitoring in South Dakota."

Hollingsworth said active post-arrival monitoring means Department of Health staff will maintain twice-daily contact with the individual to check their temperature and the presence or absence of other Ebola symptoms such as headache, joint and
