The poster project got its start in the Sioux Empire CHARACTER COUNTS! program and has been a part of this program for 18 years.

The poster project is in its third year as a statewide project for the 4-H program.

This fall, 106 high school Hometown Heroes from 48 South Dakota communities, including the Sioux Empire, will present the message, A Click Away From Chaos! How to polish your character in a social media centered world.

More than 10,000 elementary and middle school students will hear this message statewide. The Hometown Heroes will be challenging all of their local students they speak with, to carry a polished stone in their right pants pocket.


