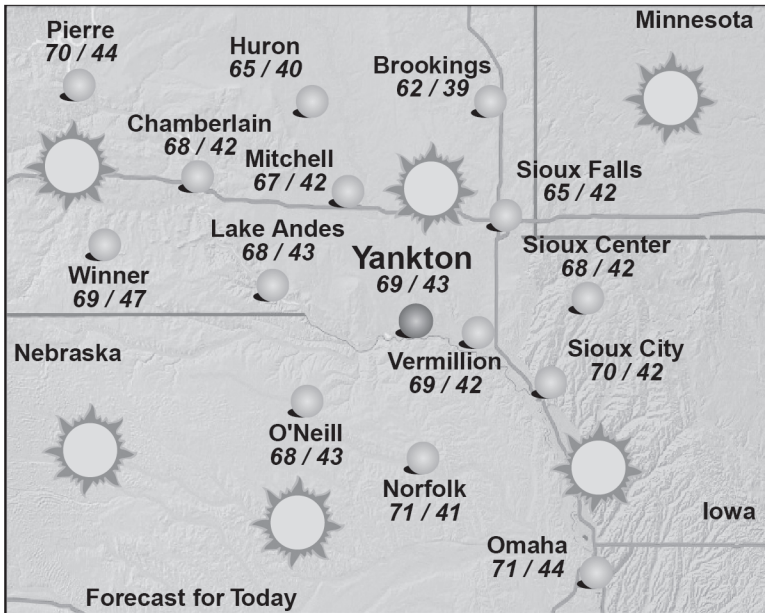

District Advisory Task Force To Meet

PIERRE — The River Basin Natural Resource District Oversight Advisory Task Force will meet on Friday, Oct. 16, in Room 413 of the Capitol in Pierre. The meeting will begin at 10 a.m. (CST). The public is invited to attend.

Senate Bill 2, as enacted by the 2015 Legislature, provided for the creation of River Basin Natural Resource Districts. This task force has been tasked with the responsibility of overseeing the implementation of these districts. At this meeting the task force will be discussing the establishment of district boundaries and subdistrict boundaries and the process to elect council members from each sub-district. The task force will also be discussing the process to develop a pilot water management plan for a district.

All interested parties are invited to attend to comment to the task force about the tasks assigned to the task force.

The River Basin Natural Resource District Oversight Advisory Task Force consists of eight members: Kim Vanne-man, Chair (Ideal); Rep. John Wiik, Vice Chair (R-Big Stone City); Sens. Jason Frerichs (D-Wilmot) and Arthur Rusch (R-Vermillion); Rep. Steven McCleery (D-Sisseton); and Paul Casper (Lake Preston), Karl Jensen (Whitewood) and Denny Kiner (Mitchell).

Elder Abuse Program Set For Oct. 20

VERMILLION — A program on Elder Abuse will be presented by Cassie Lindquist and Katie Heck of the Department of Social Services of South Dakota at 6:30 p.m. Tuesday, Oct. 20, at the Vermillion Sanford Hospital Administration board room.

Lindquist is the Adult Services and Aging Program Specialist for S.D. Social Services and has extensive expertise in the area of Elder Abuse. Heck is a Supervisor with the Adult Services and Aging Program of the Department of Social Services of South Dakota. Social Services, Health Services and Law Enforcement in South Dakota are evaluating the scope of Elder Abuse in South Dakota.

They will discuss the Signs of Elder Abuse; Risk Factors; Types of Abuse; Mandatory Reporting; Statistics and Prevention of Exploitation. The discussion will be focusing on the health care provider's assessments and responsibilities.

Older people today are more visible, more active and more independent than ever before. But as the population of older Americans grows, so does the hidden problem of elder abuse, exploitation and neglect. About 95 percent of the older people live in their homes and care is provided by family members or paid caregivers. Most elderly are not in institutions or facilities. The stress on the caregivers is great. The distinction between normal interpersonal stress and abuse is not always easy to discern. The health care professional has the legal responsibility to identify and report any indications of abuse, exploitation and neglect.

The program is sponsored by the South Dakota Nurses Association, District 11. Members and non-members are invited to attend.

Tuesday, October 12, 1965

• A variety of business was transacted during a 4 ½-hour session of the Yankton City Commission. A petition of protest signed by some 55 percent of property owners affected had been filed Oct. 2,

blocking the construction of water service main on Douglas avenue north 1,354 feet from 22nd Street.

• Yankton College has received a grant of \$150 from Aetna Life & Casualty under the organization's aid to higher education plan. The 1965 grant raised the five-year Yankton total \$550 in the Aetna Life & Casualty matching grant program begun 1961.

25 YEARS AGO

Friday, October 12, 1990

• South Dakota law officers have no authority to continue chasing Indians suspected of breaking the law if the pursuit leads onto an Indian reservation, the state Supreme Court ruled Thursday.

• Runoff into the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers' six large Missouri River reservoirs and in the river reach from Gavins Point Dam to Sioux City, Iowa, totaled a disappointing 697,000 acre-feet in September, an official said.

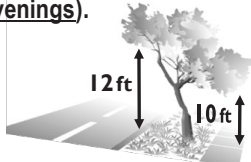
STREET TREE TRIMMING FREE DROP OFF



Yankton property owners are reminded to trim trees adjacent to sidewalks and streets. City Ordinance requires a **10 foot** clearance over sidewalks and a **12 foot** clearance over streets and alleys. Maintaining these clearances may take multiple trimmings annually. Low hanging tree branches reduce visibility for drivers, damage vehicles, make it difficult to clear streets, and damage snowplows and school buses.

Tree trimmings can be dropped off free of charge at the Transfer Station at 1200 West 23rd Street from 10/12/15 through 10/24/2015, 8:00 am - 3:45 pm, Monday-Saturday (excluding Monday & Thursday evenings).
