VERMILLION — Former congressmen Barry Goldwater Jr. of California and David Minge of Minnesota will speak Oct. 19 about "Civility & Compromise in Congress" at the University of South Dakota's Congress-to-Campus Farber Forum.

Goldwater served as a Republican in the U.S. House of Representatives from 1970 to 1984 and currently is in private business.

Minge was a Democratic member of the U.S. House from 1992 to 2000 and served as an appellate judge until his retirement in 2012.

Legislative Planning Committee To Meet

PIERRE — The Legislative Planning Committee, chaired by Rep. Scott Munsterman (R-Brookings), will meet on Thursday, Oct. 22, in Room 413 of the State Capitol, at 10 a.m. (CDT).

In the morning, the committee will conclude its look into postsecondary education in the state. Members will hear from Jennifer Stanwick-Klimek, the deputy warden at Mike Dufree State Prison, who will discuss the postsecondary education opportunities that exist for adult inmates in the state's correctional facilities. The committee will also review the benchmarks and performance indicators that have been established for both postsecondary technical education and higher education in the state, and receive some follow-up information on higher education funding from the Board of Regents.

In the afternoon, committee members will turn their attention to health care in South Dakota. They will hear from Kim Malsam-Rysdon, the secretary of the S.D. Department of Health, and others from her department who will provide information on the current state of health in South Dakota. Included in the department's presentation will be updates on the governor's proposal to expand Medicaid, the state of Indian health, and the work of the Primary Care Task Force. The meeting is open to the public, and public testimony will be taken that afternoon.

In addition to Representative Munsterman, committee members are Sen. Mike Vehle (R-Mitchell), Vice Chair; Sen. Corey Brown (R-Gettysburg), President Pro Tem; Rep. Dean Wink (R-Howes), Speaker of the House and Executive Board Chair; Sens. Terri Haverly (R-Rapid City), Ried Holien (R-Waterstown) and Scott Parsley (D-Madison); and Reps. Shawn Bordeaux (D-Mission), Kristin Conzet (R-Rapid City) and Jacqueline Sly (R-Rapid City).

Wheat for December delivery declined 5.75 cents to \$5.0250 a bushel; December corn was off 3.50 cents to 3.7550 a bushel; December oats rose 2.75 cents to 2.3450 a bushel; while November soybeans lost 5.25 cents to \$9.0525 a bushel.

Beef was lower and pork was unchanged on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. December live cattle was off .87 cent to \$1.3655 a pound; November feeder cattle fell 1.05 cents to \$1.8590 a pound; while December lean hogs was unchanged at \$.6682 a pound.
