Legislative Planning Committee To Meet

PIERRE — The Legislative Planning Committee, chaired by Rep. Scott Munsterman (R-Brookings), will meet on Thursday, Oct. 22, in Room 413 of the State Capitol, at 10 a.m. (CDT).

In the morning, the committee will conclude its look into postsecondary education in the state. Members will hear from Jennifer Stanwick-Klimek, the deputy warden at Mike Durfee State Prison, who will discuss the postsecondary education opportunities that exist for adult inmates in the state's correctional facilities. The committee will also review the benchmarks and performance indicators that have been established for both postsecondary technical education and higher education in the state, and receive some follow-up information on higher education funding from the Board of Regents.
