A Revealing 'Hidden Kennedy'


The King has spoken.

And in pretty much every fairy tale, that's all it takes for a Happy (or not-so-Happy) Ending: he decrees, and it is so. And in the new book "Rosemary: The Hidden Kennedy Daughter" by Kate Clifford Larson, you'll see how that affected

the oldest girl in what many say was America's Royal Family. When Rose Fitzgerald Kennedy went into labor on the 13th of September, 1918, aba feward har third habr'a bith would she figured her third baby's birth would be as uneventful as that of her first two children. Alas, the doctor was delayed in caring for Boston's Spanish Flu victims so the nurse, unauthorized to deliver the child, held the baby in place in the birth canal for two excruciating hours.

By the time little Rosemary Kennedy was a year old, it was obvious that something was amiss. Compared to her older brothers, "Rosie" was delayed in all milestones, which her mother blamed on "gender and temperament." Still, hoping her daughter would catch up, Rose vowed to spend more time with Rosemary.

No matter how much parental attention she had, however, Rosemary would never be a rough-and-tumble Kennedy. As younger siblings were born and quickly



tally, it became apparent that she was going to need more than the family could offer. Doctors diagnosed her as "mentally retarded"; she might also have suffered from epilepsy. Inwardly, she struggled; outwardly, she was charming and funloving. Many thought she was just "shy."

Desperate for a cure that would never come, Joseph and Rose Kennedy sent Rosemary to a succession of schools until, in 1938, a good fit was found in Great Britain but World War II intervened.

Nineteen-year-old Rosemary was pulled from that school for her safety, and her stateside return sent her into a tailspin.

That story, however, isn't all that lies inside "Rosemary: The Hidden Kennedy Daughter": author Kate Clifford Larson also lays out plenty of history, both of the family as a whole and of the world. She reaches back to the earliest Kennedy years and, as she pulls us forward, she puts into context each phase of Rosemary's life, plunging us into the way things were early in the last century. Then, believe it or not, in Larson's hands, this tragic tale culminates in an oddly happy ending.
