County Receives Drug Control Funds

PIERRE — Bon Homme County and Elk Point law enforcement agencies have received funds to combat illegal drugs.

The Bon Homme County sheriff's office received \$4,107.67 for tasers, while the Elk Point police department received \$4,076.99 for body worn camera systems.

Attorney General Marty Jackley awarded the funds to several law enforcement agencies throughout the state. The money comes from the Attorney General's Drug Control Fund.

The program is funded by drug forfeiture monies to be used for enforcement in drug control and apprehension purposes. The award money distributed for this most recent cycle totaled \$81,529.

"The Drug Control Fund allows law enforcement to combat controlled substance abuse by funding local programs with monies seized from drug arrests," Jackley said in a press release. "We are funding a number of requests for body worn cameras to assist agencies throughout the state to improve their levels of public trust and to increase public safety."

- Faulk County sheriff's office, \$1,513.61 for body worn camera systems;
  - Miner County sheriff's office, \$2,542.64 for body worn camera systems;
  - Walworth County sheriff's office, \$3,333.35 for body worn camera systems;
  - Deuel County sheriff's office, \$4,475 for body worn camera systems;
  - Roberts County sheriff's office, \$6,764 for tasers and body armor;
  - Davison County sheriff's office, \$5,031.60 for body worn camera systems;
  - Corson County sheriff's office, \$19,685 for body worn camera systems and in-car camera systems;
  - Watertown police department, \$30,000 for canine vehicle and equipment.

1,000 feet near residences and 550 feet near property lines.

The public hearing represented the second portion of Tuesday's regular commission meeting. The commissioners recessed until the evening, when the hearing was held for greater convenience for the general public. The hearing was held in the courtroom to accommodate the estimated 80 persons in attendance.

The public comment portion of the hearing lasted 1 hour, 40 minutes. The commissioners heard 35 speakers, with 25 favoring the wind ordinance and 10 opposing to it. The commissioners received an additional 17 letters in favor and seven letters in opposition. The public testimony brought a wide range of data and opinion, with the discussion becoming passionate at times.

The commissioners noted a wind farm could be constructed even with passage of the ordinance, but the county would have some controls. They added that the proposed Bon Homme ordinance follows the state's recommendations and what other counties have used.

BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grain futures were mostly higher Tuesday on the Chicago Board of Trade. Wheat for December delivery advanced 5.50 cents to \$4.9125 a bushel; December corn was up 3.75 cents to 3.73 a bushel; December oats fell 2.25 cents to 2.2475 a bushel; while November soybeans gained 5 cents to \$8.96 a bushel.

WALL ST. RECAP

U.S. stocks closed slightly lower on Tuesday as some weak earnings reports weighed on the market. IBM sank about 6 percent a day after the company reported that its revenue fell for the 14th quarter in a row. Harley-Davidson plunged 14 percent after reporting a drop in profit and cutting its forecasts for motorcycle shipments. Pizza Hut and KFC owner Yum Brands gained 2 percent after saying it would spin off its struggling China business.

The Dow Jones industrial average fell 13.43 points, or 0.1 percent, to close at 17,217.11. The Standard & Poor's 500 index slid 2.89 points, or 0.1 percent,
