# **400 USD and SDSU Students Hone Interprofessional Health Care Skills**

VERMILLION - More than 400 students from the University of South Dakota and South Dakota State University spent Tuesday, Oct. 20, on the Vermillion campus of USD learning teamwork skills in the evolving concept known as interprofessional health care. That approach emphasizes that health care professionals from different disciplines need to work closely together to improve patient outcomes. For example, a social worker, physical therapist and nurse confer, communicate and cooperate with the physician as a team when deciding how to treat someone.

Students and faculty taking part in the day-long exercises are from SDSU's

College of Pharmacy; USD's College of Arts & Sciences, which includes audiology, speech language pathology and clinical psychology; the USD Sanford School of Medicine's medical program and center for disabilities: USD's School of Health Sciences, which includes addiction studies, dental hygiene, medical laboratory science, nursing, occupational therapy, physician assistant, physical therapy, public health, social work and health sciences major.

The event, which started in 1999. provides the students a great chance to interact with and learn about other health professionals, and how they can work together to provide team-based

care," said Joy Karges, professor of physical therapy and Chair of the interprofessional training event at USD.

"This is an important event in the development of health care professionals in South Dakota, setting standards for interprofessional health sciences education and practice," added Michael Lawler, Ph.D., dean of USD's School of Health Sciences, which is leading a statewide effort that's unique in the United States because it blends government, education and health institutions to advance interprofessionalism. ## Thousands Now Use IRS Direct Pay, Make Tax Payments From Home

**DENVER – Thousands** of taxpayers are now using the successful web-based system — IRS Direct Pay – on IRS.gov, which lets taxpayers pay their tax bills or make estimated tax payments directly from checking or savings accounts without any fees or pre-registration.

"It saves time and gets you out of traffic," said Karen Connelly, an IRS spokesperson in Denver. "IRS Direct Pay is just part of our effort to add more online tools to

help taxpayers. It allows you to make a payment from the convenience of a home computer—no need to drive to a local IRS office just to make a

Introduced in 2014, more than a million tax payments have already been made through the IRS Direct Pav system. With IRS Direct Pay, taxpayers receive instant confirmation that the payment has been submitted, and the system is available 24 hours a day, 7 days a

week. Bank account information is not retained in IRS systems after payments are

From the "Pay Your Tax Bill" icon at the top of the IRS home page, taxpayers can access IRS Direct Pay, which walks the taxpayer through five simple steps. The steps include providing your tax information, verifying your identity, entering your payment information, reviewing and electronically signing and recording your

online confirmation. Connelly said IRS Direct Pay offers 30-day advance payment scheduling, payment rescheduling or cancellations, and a payment status search. Direct Pay cannot be used to pay business taxes. Taxpayers who wish to e-pay their federal business taxes should enroll in the Electronic Federal Tax Payment System (EFTPS), or click on the "Pay Your Tax Bill" icon on IRS.gov to check out other payment options.
