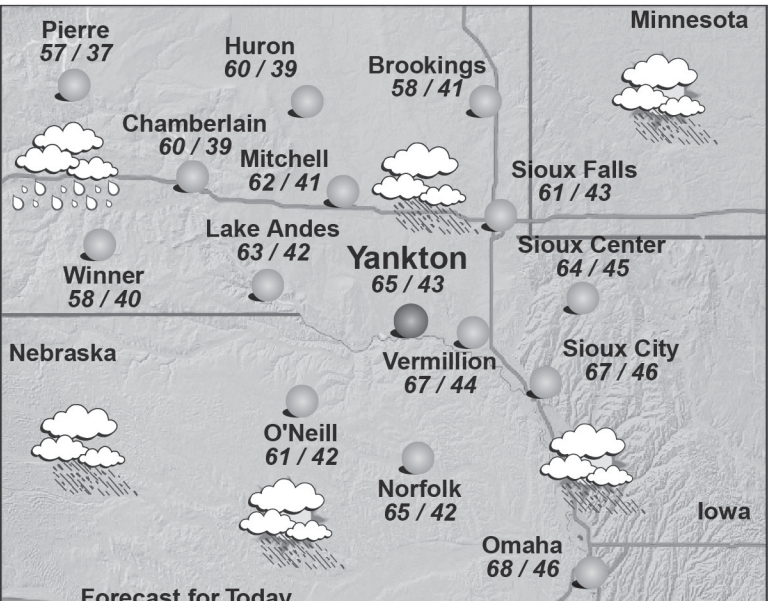

go through a step-by-step process, but they worked together to eliminate some of those timeline barriers." "This was a change in paradigm," Hoffner added. "YAPG wanted to create jobs and were doing a good job of enhancing buildings when, all of a sudden, there was a shift. The paradigm shifted because there was such a need for housing in the community, and they switched quickly to make the transition go smoothly." The need for affordable housing has gotten more pressing in recent years, culminating in people turning down job opportunities in Yankton after being unable to find housing. "One local business owner hired someone who worked for a couple weeks, who then went back to their old job after being unable to find a place to live," Dejong recalled. While the building process is going well now, the situation could change as fall progresses into winter, mean-

ing those involved have to keep their options open. "Our short-term goal is to get two more months to possibly get the asphalt in so they can build in winter," explained Hoffner. "The key is not to have a frost. "The long term is for the building process to go smoothly," Hoffner continued. "The area will probably fill up (with people) fast, and a true optimist looks at the field beyond it and says, 'Let's move on and put up another housing development.'" Moody believes that renters will benefit from the prices of the new units. "It's a reasonable rent for a new building," he said. "There will be nine-foot ceilings, glass-topped stoves, washers and dryers in the units and an exercise room." If all goes as planned, the apartment units will be available for use by next May.

NPS Seeks Input On Property Management

Missouri National Recreational River (MNRR) has developed a draft Property Management Plan (PMP) for the following MNRR properties: Green Island (60 acres), Bow Creek Recreation Area (205 acres), and Mulberry Bend (31 acres), located within Cedar and Dixon counties, Nebraska. "The purpose of this plan is to decide how the National Park Service (NPS) can best fulfill MNRR's purpose and protect its resources unimpaired for the enjoyment of present and future generations at the three properties," said MNRR Superintendent Rick Clark. The management plan identifies actions for recreational site development, resource management, interpretation/education and establish management actions on certain issues, such as access, hunting and camping. The objectives of the Property Management Plan are to:
• Involve the public in determining management opportunities for MNRR properties.
• Provide a wide range of public recreational opportunities and experiences for various users.
• Preserve and enhance natural and cultural resources at MNRR properties.
• Encourage a connection between people and the properties' natural and cultural resources. The National Park Service announces a 30-day public review period for the Property Management Plan (PMP). During this period, the public is invited to identify issues or concerns they might have with the proposed project so that the NPS can appropriately consider them in the Environmental Assessment (EA) and planning process. Public comments will be accepted through Nov. 18, 2015. You may provide comments in any of the following ways:
