Crofton Rides Momentum In Quest For Tenth Straight Title rounded out the Warriors' four

Crofton head cross country coach Jayne Arens feels her Warriors have momentum going into state.

Not something the rest of Class D wants to hear about the nine-time defending state champions.

Crofton will be going for its 10th straight girls' crown and its second boys' title in three years when the Nebraska State Meet takes to the course in Kearney today (Friday).

"Both our boys and girls have really stepped up and run strong," Coach Arens said. We've had a few kids sick, but others have stepped up.

Crofton comes in off a sweep of the District D-2 meet, capping off a pre-state schedule that saw the Warriors competing against top teams in Class B and C, as

well as Class D.

"We're lucky. There are a lot of great schools around here. In most of our meets we were running against bigger schools," Coach Arens said.

As they have throughout their title run, the Warriors are more focused on the process than the outcome.

"Our big goal is for everyone to run good, solid races, and to be happy with how they ran," Coach Arens said. "We'll be happy as coaches if that happens.

On the girls' side, Crofton has been led by sophomore Haley Arens, second in the state meet a year ago.

"Haley's really been pushing hard," Coach Arens said. "It's been neat to see her develop as a runner, run her own race.²

Junior Krista Zavadil, senior Kvla Dendinger and junior Samantha Altwine have typically scorers.

"Krista has really stepped up. Her times have dropped ever time out," Coach Arens said. "Kyla has been a strong role model, a good leader for the team. Samantha's drive has really helped the team."

Freshman Jessica Lange and senior Keeley Hagge round out the Warriors' state meet roster.

Jessica has come into her own," Coach Arens said. "Keeley had some injury issues, but she has been cutting times this season.

Also qualified in the girls' race is Randolph freshman Addison Villwok, who placed 14th in District D-2.

The Crofton boys have been led all season by junior Jake Neuhalfen, who surged to the front of the Warrior pack.

'Each meet it amazes me how much he is cutting his times," Coach Arens said. "Last year he didn't make varsity.
