Gayville-Volin Eyes Another Run At Class B Title

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This season the Gayville-Volin girls have run under the mantra, "Run

Today (Saturday), they're also looking to run thankful and fast.

Gayville-Volin, runner-up to Ipswich in each of the past three seasons, will look another strong finish as it takes to Sioux Falls' Yankton Trails Park for the South Dakota State Cross Country Championships.

The Raiders are a unique squad, sporting two former state champions (Genevieve Clark in 2012, Laura Nelson in 2013), three who also compete in volleyball (Clark, Megan Hirsch and Elianna Clark) and no freshmen or middle schoolers. Gayville-Volin is the only full squad (five runners) without a runner from grades 7-9 (Sully Buttes has four runners, all in grades 10-12), and the Raiders are one of two Class B girls' teams with three varsity volleyball players in their state meet lineup. (Northwestern has three varsity, one JV player among its five.)

"Most team's have a volleyball player or two," said Gayville-Volin head coach Larry Buffington. "The girls take a lot of pride in that. They work hard and enjoy being a part of both teams.

The number of upperclassmen for a girls' team is rare. In all three classes combined, there is only one other girls' program that will not have a runner from grades 7-9 competing at state: Sioux Falls Washington. There are 10 full boys' teams without a runner in grades 7-9, as well as two other scoring teams.

There are more seventh and eighth graders in the state field than there are grades 10-12," Buffington noted. In Class B, there are 51 middle schoolers and 47 in grades 10-12, including just 12 seniors.

One of those seniors is Genny Clark, who won state as a freshman and has helped put the Raiders on the awards stand the past three seasons.

"Genny has left a legacy in our program," Buffington said. "Not only has she done a good job of leading the program, she has helped build it."

As the Raiders enter the meet, they will look to continue to enjoy
