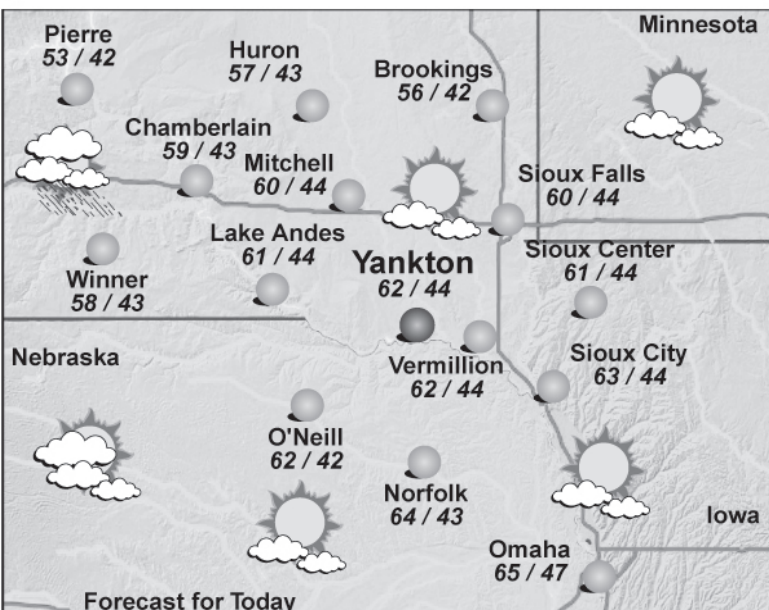

Firefighters Respond To Apartment Blaze

The Yankton Fire Department was summoned to a call at a two-story apartment house on E. 15th St. Sunday morning. According to a press release, tenants noticed smoke coming from the basement just before 1 a.m. An apartment in the basement had a couch on fire while the tenant in that apartment slept. Although the building was full of smoke, the fire was mostly extinguished by the building's residents. Firefighters were on scene for about 20 minutes. The apartment was equipped with heat detectors that at some point had been tampered with, according to the press release. The detectors rely on a specified heat range to activate. Most of the detectors were inoperable and would not have notified the tenants. There were no smoke detectors in the building. Firefighters found one heat detector blocking open the door to an interior stairway. The detector had been sitting on a shelf in the stairwell. "This is a reminder that building owners are responsible for installing and maintaining fire alarms in apartment buildings," the press release noted. "The tenants (in this incident) were lucky to escape unharmed."

Bookkeeping Seminar Set For Thursday

The South Dakota Department of Revenue will host a new bookkeeping seminar Oct. 29 in Yankton. The seminar, which takes place at the Avera Sacred Heart Pavilion, is designed for those who already have a basic understanding of tax requirements. The class will give attendees a more hands-on experience in filling out returns, identifying and reporting use tax, using EPath and record keeping. The Department of Revenue Tax Agents recommend sending specific questions and topics for discussion ahead of seminar dates for in-depth coverage and education. Attendees are asked to bring a calculator or a phone with a calculator to the seminar. The bookkeeping seminar is one of many courses the South Dakota Department of Revenue will offer in several South Dakota cities throughout fall. Department of Revenue agents will cover topics such as Sales Tax, taxes related to gaming, Use Tax and Contractors' Excise Tax, through seminars in four South Dakota locations. The seminars, which are open to the public, will take place in Sioux Falls, Yankton, Rapid City and Deadwood. The Department will also offer a webinar Nov. 18 on Sales Tax. USD History Prof. Presents Annual Harrington Lecture On Greece

VERMILLION — University of South Dakota history professor Clayton Lehmann will present "Imagining Greece" at the 63rd Annual Harrington Lecture at 7 p.m. on Wednesday, Oct. 28, in Old Main's Farber Hall. Lehmann, Ph.D., will address how people perceive Greece, from the poet Homer in ancient history to the media coverage of recent elections. His talk will also compare outsiders' perspectives of Greece with how Greeks think about themselves. Since joining USD in 1988, Lehmann has taught classes in Greek and Roman history, Western civilization,

archaeology, epigraphy, language and literature. A South Dakota native, Lehmann earned his bachelor's degree from Augustana College, his master's degree from the University of Maryland and a doctorate in ancient history from the University of Chicago. While working on his dissertation, he traveled to Greece and developed a life-long love of the country. Lehmann regularly returns to Greece to travel and study, three times as the Gertrude Smith Professor at the American School of Classical Studies to direct an intensive summer study tour of Greece for advanced students and teachers of the classics. He

also runs a study-abroad program that takes students from USD and other institutions to Greece, where the group travels to historic and cultural locations on a sailing yacht. Since this program's inception 2005, 115 students have traveled and studied in various parts of the country with Lehmann and his fellow faculty members. Much of Lehmann's research focuses on Greek history with his most recent work concerning the Greek historian Thucydides. Named in 1966 in honor of Elbert Harrington, professor of speech and dean of USD's College of Arts &

Sciences (1945-1970), the lecture is an annual event featuring a distinguished professor with long-standing service to the College of Arts & Sciences. Each year a faculty committee from the department recommends to the dean the name of a faculty member to deliver the Harrington Lecture. The faculty member must be a teacher and scholar, and the lecture must be non-technical, blending insight into liberal education with the faculty member's work as a scholar. A reception will be held immediately following the lecture.

NE Neb. Comm. Action Partnership To Celebrate Weatherization Day

PENDER, Neb. — Each year, Oct. 30 is recognized as Weatherization Day. This day marks the annual opportunity to bring attention to the fact that low income households spend a disproportionate percentage of their annual income on home energy bills. Northeast Nebraska Community Action Partnership (NENCAP) provides cost effective, permanent solutions for reducing the heavy energy burden these families endure. Weatherization programs not only save energy through advanced technologies to improve the energy affordability for low-income families, but also save lives and improve the health and safety of families by identifying carbon monoxide hazards, poor indoor air quality, mold and other health threats. With the help of the US Department of Energy, more than 7 million homes have been weatherized across the nation since 1976. Below are some statistics supporting the benefits of home weatherization practices: • For every \$1 invested, weatherization returns \$2.51 to the household and society, \$437 or more in annual utility bill savings year

after year at current energy prices; • Energy savings average 35 percent of consumption for the typical low-income home pre-weatherization consumption; • Weatherization decreases national energy consumption by the equivalent of 24.1 million barrels of oil annually; • Reduces residential and power plant emissions of carbon dioxide by 2.65 metric ton per year per home; and • Over the life of the corrective measures, saves 53 metric tons of CO2 emissions per house. NENCAP Weatherization Program serves Antelope, Burt, Cedar, Cuming, Dakota, Dixon, Dodge, Knox, Madison, Pierce, Stanton, Thurston, Washington and Wayne counties and provides free, grant funded weatherization services including energy efficient home improvements such as insulation, air sealing and replacement of inefficient or unsafe furnaces. Eligibility requires an application, income qualification and homeowner approval. Homes both rented or owned may be eligible. - 75 YEARS AGO Saturday, October 26, 1940 Preliminary work for the installation of the Food Stamp plan in Yankton County is nearing completion, a group of workers in the Social Security office under the director of the CIO, said he and some other CIO officials endorsed Lewis' statement. As a courtesy to a member of the president's cabinet who will be in Yankton, the Yankton Chamber Commerce is to have U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Claude R. Wickard as its guest at a dinner to be held at Hotel Yankton. 50 YEARS AGO Tuesday, October 26, 1965 The plat of airport land which was purchased some time ago from Elmer Williams was accepted Monday night by the Yankton city commission, and final payment for 54.6 acres at \$500 per acre was approved upon presentation of warranty deed and valid title. Viet Cong forces kept hitting at the Plei Me Special Forces camp today despite more heavy air strikes and Vietnamese ground reinforcements supported by U.S. troops. Military authorities said after a quiet night at the camp 210 miles northeast of Saigon, the Communists launched a "vigorous attack" shortly after noon using mortars and recoilless rifles. 25 YEARS AGO Friday, October 26, 1990 The action was probably hotter at the Press & Dakotan District 19 Legislative debate than the Bucks' trouncing of the Sioux Falls Lincoln Patriots 37-0 Thursday night. Between 150 and 200 people turned out at the Yankton Inn to listen to the two Senate and four House candidates debate the issues during a two hour and 20-minute exchange featuring prepared questions as well as questions from the audience. Descendants of the Indians killed and hurt in the Wounded Knee massacre 100 years ago received their long-awaited apology from the U.S. government Thursday. The House gave final congressional approval to a resolution expressing the government's "deep regret" for the event that marked the end of the Indian wars.
