

SDPB To Air Effigy Return Banquet Nov. 1

PIERRE — The South Dakota State Historical Society's recent banquet held during the celebration for the return of the Great Sioux Horse Effigy will be broadcast on South Dakota Public Broadcasting Television on Sunday, Nov. 1, at 2 p.m. CST.

Two prominent speakers made presentations at the banquet, including Kevin Gover, director of the National Museum of the American Indian in Washington, D.C., and Gaylord Torrence, senior curator of American In-

dian Art at the Nelson-Atkins Museum of Art in Kansas City. Torrence was one of the chief curators involved in the organization of the international touring exhibition, "The Plains Indians: Artists of Earth and Sky," which included the Great Sioux Horse Effigy. Jay Vogt, director of the South Dakota State Historical Society, served as the master of ceremonies for the evening.

"We are especially excited about the broadcast," said Vogt. "Response to the pres-

entations after the banquet was tremendous, and I think people will be very interested in what the speakers had to say."

South Dakota Public Broadcasting recorded the event at the Ramkota in Pierre on Sunday, Oct. 11, as part of what is hoped to become an annual program and a new partnership between the South Dakota State Historical Society, South Dakota Public Broadcasting and the Smithsonian Affiliations program.

"We are working out the details between the State Historical Society, the Smithsonian Institution and South Dakota Public Broadcasting for a new partnership," said Jay Smith, museum director and Smithsonian Affiliations coordinator for the society. "We hope to annually host in the state a Smithsonian speaker for broadcast on SDPB starting next year." The official announcement is pending.

CHICAGO (AP) — Grain futures were mostly higher Monday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for September delivery advanced 18.50 cents to \$5.09 a bushel; September corn was up 4.75 cents to 3.8450 a bushel; December oats were 1 cent higher to 2.2875 a bushel; while November soybeans declined 10.50 cents to \$8.85 bushel.

Beef and pork were lower on

the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. August live cattle was off 1.40 cents to \$1.42 a pound; August feeder cattle fell 2.03 cents to \$1.9122 a pound; while August lean hogs were .75 cent lower at \$6.285 a pound.
