Soccer: Dordt Sweeps Past MMC

The Mount Marty College soccer teams each got off to slow starts in the final home matches of the season as Dordt collected a sweep of the Lancers in Great Plains Athletic Conference action on Tuesday at Easton Field.

In the women's match, Dordt scored all of its goals in the first 46 minutes on the way to a 5-0 victory. In the men's match, Dordt claimed a 10-0 halftime lead and coasted to an 11-0 victory.

MMC, each winless in GPAC play, will look to finish the season on a positive note at Concordia on Saturday.

"I want to see our guys go out there and give it their all, play with the confidence and teamwork they had in the second half (today)," said Mount Marty head coach Peter Shepherd. "I want our girls to push for the win."

Dordt scored three times in a nine-minute span late in the first half, then scored on the opening possession of the second half to blow open what was a 1-0 game through 32 minutes.

"Today was probably the worst we've played in a conference game," Shepherd said. "We started slow, disjointed, in the first half."

Natalie Sakuma scored the first two Dordt goals and assisted on the third, a score by Racquelle Mouw. Jalissa DeHaan scored the other first-half goal. Kenzie Bousema converted a Nicole Postman pass for a score just 20 seconds into the second half.

Marissa LeDuc assisted on the first Dordt goal. Deianira Felts made two saves on goal for the Defenders.

The Lancers found their composure in the second half and held the Defenders to just six shots in the second half. Dordt had 16 first-half shots.

"Coach told us we needed to clean up our play. We needed our passes to be aggressive," said MMC senior Alexandria Max. "We showed what we could do after that goal (to start the second half), and shut them out the rest of the way."

Katlyn Westcott and Madison Profeta each had a shot on goal for MMC.

Senior goalkeeper Courtney True, in her final home match, finished with 10 saves. She has 487 career saves entering her final match.

Besides Max and True, the Lancers will graduate Westcott

and Maggie Bisgard. Like True, Bisgard is a Yannton grad.

"I'll definitely miss all the seniors. I've loved playing with Courtney these past three years," Max said. "I'll miss playing competitive soccer. College soccer is more competitive. It makes you push yourself."

But Max and the rest of the Lancers are hoping to make some noise in the finale.

"We know what we're capable of," she said. "We've got one last hurrah."

MEN

Dordt's Alex Durbin either scored or assisted on seven of the Defenders' first eight goals as Dordt rolled to a 10-0 halftime lead in a must-win match.

"In the first half, we weren't a team on the field. We were 11 individuals, and there aren't too many sports where you can play like that and succeed," Shepherd said. "We got a few selfish fouls that got us cards."

Besides giving up 10 first-half goals, the Lancers also had two cards, resulting in the ejection of Joseph Finn. MMC played the final 43:10 down a player, but only gave up a penalty kick goal — from the red card — and one other goal, which came 4:23 into the second half.

"In the second half we came out as 10 teammates. We didn't give up," Shepherd said. "We created a few opportunities and almost scored."

Durbin had three goals and four assists for Dordt. Shane Schaar, V.J. Hachaba, Lucas Vanderberg and Nathan Struyk each had a goal and an assist. Four other players each recorded a goal, with three others recording an assist.

Juan Magana had three of MMC's seven shots on goal. Mauricio Marquez, Colin Linde, Ludwin Arana and Finn each had one shot on goal.

Dordt played three different goalkeepers, with Jack McCool making three saves and Travis Viet and Aman Aric recording two saves each. Kier Carrier made two saves in goal for Mount Marty.

MMC will seek its first win and a potential spoiler's role at Concordia on Saturday.

"We need to play with the confidence, with the teamwork we had in the second half," Shepherd said. "We need to play the full 90 minutes like that."

Levi Gomez, Magana, Arana and Danny Barillas each concluded the home portion of their careers on Tuesday.
