Five Fort Carson Soldiers Killed In Afghanistan

FORT CARSON, Colo. — Five Fort Carson soldiers were killed when their unit was attacked with an improvised bomb in Afghanistan, the Defense Department said Wednesday.

The soldiers killed in Monday's attack were identified as Capt. Dale A. Goetz, 43, of White, S.D.; Staff Sgt. Jesse Infante, 30, of Cypress, Texas; Staff Sgt. Kevin J. Kessler, 32, of Canton, Ohio; Staff Sgt. Matthew J. West, 36, of Conover, Wis.; and Pfc. Chad D. Clements, 26, of Huntington, Ind.

West was assigned to the 71st Explosive Ordnance Disposal Group. The others were part of the 4th Infantry Division's 4th Brigade Combat Team, which arrived in Afghanistan this summer.

The attack happened in the Arghandab River Valley, a lush and heavily mined Taliban stronghold. Clements' family in Huntington, Ind., told WTHR-TV that he died as a Humvee he was in was hit by an explosion near Kandahar.

Clements graduated from Huntington North High School in 2002 and enlisted in the Army last year for financial reasons and was deployed to Afghanistan July 25. He received the National Defense Service Medal and Afghanistan Campaign Medal.

The service did a lot for him, probably taught him to appreciate things a little more," said his grandmother, Betty Beady. She last spoke to her grandson Saturday.

Family and friends described him as an easy going, reserved and thoughtful person who valued family.

West was previously deployed to Afghanistan in 2006 and served in Iraq from March 2008 to June 2009. He received the Bronze Star and Joint Service Commendation Medal.

West is survived by his wife and three children. West's sister, Kristine Willis, said her brother was a 1992 graduate of Gaylord High School in Michigan.

Infante was an explosive ordnance specialist who joined the Army in 2000. He was deployed to Iraq in December 2005 for a year and to Afghanistan July 25. He received the Army Commendation Medal and Army Achievement Medal.

Kessler, a motor transport operator, joined the Army in June 2004. He served in Iraq for a year starting in January 2005 and again from May 2007 to August 2008. He was deployed to Afghanistan in May. He received the Army Commendation Medal with Valor and Army Achievement Medal.

enclosed yet, which is one of the next steps in the construction process.

"They are going to try and get the building enclosed in the next month, which will include all the glass," she said.

Mayer's staff will also move from the DakotaDome to the Wellness Center, and he will also see his staff expand.

"We will be able add a third staffer, and the graduate assistants we have will go up from two to four," he said.

Mayer added that the Wellness Center will be a great addition to USD.

The students deserve this facility. It's been a long time coming," he said. "We are the last state university in the state to add a Wellness Center for the students."

SDSU Proposes Imaging Sciences Institute

BROOKINGS — South Dakota State University wants to establish an on-campus institute to better tap its partnership with a nearby federal center that collects and archives satellite images, school officials said Wednesday.

The U.S. Geological Survey's EROS Data Center near Sioux Falls is the main federal repository for satellite images. South Dakota State already partners with EROS on the processing and calibration of images, but the proposed Imaging Sciences Institute would expand the school's role into all aspects of remote sensing and imaging, including acquisition, optimization, storage, archiving and training.

"The Imaging Sciences Institute is going to cut across all these other applications," SDSU President David Chicoine said during a visit to the university and EROS. He was joined by Sen. Tim Johnson, D-S.D., USGS Director Marcia McNutt and other university officials.

The institute is in the vetting stage, and it would take partnerships with other governmental entities, business and industry and financing to make a reality. The next steps will be to set up an advisory board, partner with other agencies and build state and federal support, officials said.

willing to help people. I called him one night because the football games were about to come on. It was winter, and he had gone to Wal-Mart. He said, 'I'm changing a tire in the Wal-Mart parking lot for an old lady who had a flat. What do you want? I'm almost done, and it's cold out here!'"

Jose has been in a medically induced coma since the accident and is on a ventilator. Antonio said his brother will probably be in the hospital for two to three months. In the meantime, the medical insurance he has with his job is expected to run out and his insurance costs will probably double.

The family has not decided where Jose will stay when he does get out of the hospital. Antonio said he may come to Yankton or go with his mother, Cora, to Texas. Until Jose is conscious and the extent of his rehabilitation needs are determined, it is difficult to plan for that eventually, he said.

"I just know that, whenever he does get out, he's going to need some help," he stated. "He's not going to be able to go back to work anytime soon."
