Safe Driving Urged During Holiday Weekend

PIERRE — Gov. Mike Rounds is asking motorists to use extra caution on South Dakota highways during the Labor Day travel weekend.

Four people were killed and 92 others were injured on South Dakota roads during the last two Labor Day weekends. Half of the fatalities were alcohol-related.

"If motorists would just remember to designate a sober driver, to use seatbelts on every trip and pay attention to speed limits and road conditions, we could make our highways much safer for holiday travel," the Governor said.

For the past several years, the number of highway fatalities on South Dakota roads has declined.

However, the number of people killed in highway crashes so far this year is ahead of last year, according to the State Office of Accident Records.

Through the end of August, 95 people had died in crashes on South Dakota roads. That compares with 93 fatalities for the same period in 2009.

That deadly trend can be reversed only if everyone does their part, Gov. Rounds said.

"Most crashes are entirely preventable," the Governor said. "Please enjoy the holiday weekend, but take personal responsibility for your safety and your family's safety - not only this holiday weekend but every time you travel."

According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, most children need to ride in a car seat until they are at least 8 years old or they have reached the proper height and weight of 4 feet, 9 inches and more than 80 pounds.

ilar in nature and happened in a short time span," he stated.

The focus now needs to be on awareness of the dangers of natural gas and the responsibilities of those who utilize it, Glanzer added.

"As soon as the NorthWestern meter ends, that's where the customer's service and responsibility lie," he said. "We need to pay more attention to what is going on in our homes. For the most part, if you leave (appliances) alone, they'll operate fine. But if you haven't had your furnace or piping system checked in 10-15 years, it may be time to do that. The moment you think something is awry, you need an expert to come in and look at it."

"Keep the areas around appliances and equipment clean and unblocked to allow proper air flow," Glanzer added. "A lot of times where your furnace is, is where you're going to store things. If you're tempted to lean something up against that furnace gas line - don't. Keep it open. Let it breathe."

Consumers need to be familiar with the rotten egg smell of

natural gas, according to Glanzer.

"If people see a downed power line, they know what to do," he said. "But if they smell natural gas in the house, they may wonder about it but don't call anybody. If you think you smell something like sewer gas or rotten eggs, get out of the house and make the phone call (to your natural gas provider or 9-1-1)."

If you suspect a gas leak in your home, you can reach NorthWestern by calling 1-800-245-6977.

"If there's gas in the house or not, our service to figure out if there is, is free," Glanzer said. "Safety is our utmost concern."

had a male friend with her. When she entered her residence, there was a guy in there already. He started shoving her around, and took a bat and began striking her with it. The male friend came in and tried to intervene. He was also hit with the bat. This went on until the suspect ran off."

Hunhoff wasn't aware of either victim requiring hospitalization.

On Tuesday, the sheriff's office arrested David Zepher, 33, Yankton, on two counts of aggravated assault. He was also arrested

ed on a warrant for second-degree petty theft. Hunhoff said Zepher was known by the female victim.

Deputies executed a search warrant Wednesday at a residence along East 12th Street in Yankton where Zepher lives and seized the bat allegedly used in the assault.

Upon visiting the residence, deputies suspected the presence of drugs and obtained a second search warrant. Consequently, Robert Taylor, 42, Yankton, was arrested for possession of drug paraphernalia, two counts of possession of marijuana and two counts of possession of a controlled substance. Taylor also lives in the home.

"(The deputies) kept their eyes open and did a good job," Hunhoff said.
