Discussing issues of sexuality is often uncomfortable for parents and youth. This session will help parents plan how they want to prepare youth for the changes of puberty and adolescence.

It is presented by South Dakota Parent Connection and appropriate for parents and those working with students with cognitive, develop-

mental, emotional/behavioral, or physical special needs.

Yankton Police Warn Of Scam

The Yankton Police Department is warning of a scam that has already resulted in one local business losing more than \$900.

In August, a business was contacted about providing a product for an agreed upon price which was to be charged to a credit card. Then the "customer" asked the business to charge an extra \$850 for transportation fees to get the product to its destination. A request was then made for the business to send the transportation fee in the form of a money order to what is supposed to be a transportation company, which will come pick up the product.

In these scams, the business ends up losing the transportation fee — in this case, \$850 plus fees — because it pays that money out of its pocket and only later discovers that the credit card was stolen and no payment will be received.

Police said at least two businesses have been targeted in Yankton, and one of them received several calls within one day.

These scams can take many forms, but police warn that if you are asked to give money to get money, the chances are very good that it is a scam.

The Yankton Community Library, 515 Walnut, has announced the start of a lapsit program, "Baby and Me."

A library lapsit program is an interactive program for infants, birth through 12 months, and one parent or caregiver. Infants sit on the lap of or on the floor with the adult. Programs run approximately 20 minutes. Lapsits typically incorporate rhymes, songs, finger plays, short stories, board books, poems, bubbles, shaker instruments and/or puppets. The facilitator guides parents/caregivers in one-on-one interactions with their baby that stimulate brain development, while strengthening bonding.
