Freeze Warning Issued For NW Neb.

The National Weather Service has issued a freeze warning for the northwest corner of the Nebraska Panhandle and for southeast Wyoming.

The service said in a news release Monday afternoon that "some of the coolest air of the season" is expected overnight.

The overnight low could hit the mid- to upper 20s in some low spots, temperatures that could damage some plants.

The service's warning is in effect from 2 a.m. to 8 a.m. MDT Tuesday and includes the cities of Alliance, Chadron and Harrison.

S.F. Woman And Child Attacked

SIOUX FALLS (AP) — Authorities say two people have been taken to a Sioux Falls hospital after an attack.

The Police Department said in a news release that officers and emergency medical units responded a little after 2:20 p.m. Monday to a report of a stabbing.

Police say that an adult female and a young child were injured and were taken to the hospital.

A man identified as 28-year-old Justin Scott Doescher was arrested on suspicion of aggravated assault on the woman and assault on the child.

Doescher remains in custody. Other details were not available.

Fire Damages Home While Residents Gone

ABERDEEN (AP) — A fire heavily damaged the home of some Aberdeen residents while they were gone camping.

Aberdeen battalion chief Kevin Van Meter says the blaze was reported around midnight and that firefighters were still at the scene at 2 a.m. Monday.

Van Meter told the Aberdeen American News that the fire started on the back deck. Neighbors say they heard a loud popping sound before they saw the flames. He says a propane tank on the deck probably exploded.

Flames burned into the kitchen and an office area, and there was smoke damage throughout the structure.

Van Meter says investigators are looking into what caused the fire, but it is not considered a suspicious occurrence.

Health Reasons Cited For Inmate's Parole

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — A Nebraska prison inmate who apparently is too ill or injured to pose a threat to anyone soon will be placed on parole.

Charles Talley is scheduled to leave prison control on Wednesday, having served 16 years of his sentence of 32-to-55 years.

The Nebraska Parole Board decided Aug. 26 that the 46-year-old Talley would be paroled.

Board member Esther Casmer says Talley is being released because of his medical condition. She would not provide details, other than to say he's in a long-term care facility.

Prisons spokeswoman Dawn Renee Smith would say only that Talley has not returned to his Lincoln cell since being attacked in April 2009.

Talley was convicted in Cheyenne County in 1995 of second-degree murder and other charges.

2 Neb. Inmates Say Privileges Denied

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — Two men on Nebraska's death row for their roles in the 2002 Norfolk bank slayings say prison officials denied them rights guaranteed under a 24-year-old agreement secured by four other inmates sentenced to die, according to documents filed in federal court.

Eric Vela and Jorge Galindo said in court filings that they weren't given proper access to the law library, exercise yard or the day room, among other things, when they were segregated from other death-row inmates at Tecumseh State Correctional Institution for disciplinary reasons.

"Where a prisoner is confined to continuous and long-term segregation, outdoor exercise is a basic human need, the failure to provide which is a dangerous and inhumane deprivation," their court filings say.

Vela and Galindo, both 29, have asked a federal judge to order prison officials to comply with a 1986 consent decree that was reached between prison officials and four other death-row inmates. The agreement outlines the amount of time death-row inmates are allotted to use the law library, exercise yard and day room; guarantees one phone call per day; and mandates training in legal research, among other things.

If U.S. District Judge Warren Urbom were to refuse to enforce the agreement, Vela and Galindo's filing instead asks that he order the consent decree to be updated.

Proposal Would Create Tribal National Park

SIOUX FALLS — Thousands of acres taken from the Oglala Sioux Tribe nearly 70 years ago would be returned and managed as a tribal national park under a proposal from the National Park Service.

The change involves the 208 square-mile South Unit that's part of Badlands National Park in southwest South Dakota.

In 1942, the U.S. government's War Department took what is now the South Unit from the Pine Ridge Indian Reservation to establish a practice bombing range that was used until the 1960s. The land was later returned to the tribe as government-held trust land to be managed by the Park Service as part of Badlands National Park.

Giving the tribe responsibility for the land is the preferred option from four management alternatives for the South Unit. It would be the first tribal national park in the nation and require congressional approval, said Steve Thiede, deputy superintendent of Badlands National Park.

"We're setting precedence, kind of a scary place but kind of an exciting place to be too," said Thiede.

The 133,300-acre South Unit and the more heavily visited 109,456-acre North Unit within Badlands National Park are now managed by the National Park Service.

Birgitl Kills Straight, executive director of the Oglala Sioux Parks and Recreation Authority, said full conversion to tribal management would take several years.

He said a tribal national park would complement a Lakota Heritage and Education Center being built by the tribe and tie in with a proposed scenic byway through the reservation to the Crazy Horse Monument being carved in the Black Hills.

The new management plan and accompanying environmental impact statement for the South Unit are subject to a 60-day comment period that will include five public meetings in South Dakota Sept. 14-16 and one in Washington, D.C., in October.

The preferred alternative could be adjusted or changed altogether, based on the comment period, Thiede said.

"One of the things with this plan is we've done so many public meetings — 18 listening sessions and some other things — that we think we've got a pretty good handle on what the public wants."

"So I'd say the odds of that (major changes) are slim, but it's completely open and that's what the process is all about — doing what the public wants us to do."

At least 95 percent of the facilities for visitor use and park management are located in the North Unit, which is connected to Interstate 90 and draws more than 900,000 visitors annually.

The South Unit draws around 9,500 visitors annually and is operating this fiscal year on a \$166,000 budget. The full park's operating budget is \$4.6 million, according to the National Park Service.

Hundreds of Indian families were forced off the land in the 1940s. Some considered it their contribution to the war effort, while descendants of some families believe the land should be returned to them, Kills Straight said.
