

Emmett Reistroffer of Sioux Falls, chairman of the campaign committee Yes for Compassion, Yes on 13, said opponents are ignoring the restrictions written into the ballot measure.

For example, he said. opponents falsely claim that the proposed law would allow medical marijuana dispensaries near to schools or day-care centers. But the measure bans all dispensaries, and instead requires patients or their designated caregivers to cultivate and handle the

marijuana. "They are simply ignoring the restrictions we have written into our proposal," Reistroffer told The Associated Press. "They really have designed a campaign around fear and rhet-

oric and spreading misinformation. The South Dakota proposal is much more restrictive than laws in other

states that have legalized marijuana for medical uses, Reistroffer said. The proposal would legalize the limited use of marijuana to treat severe

debilitating pain, nausea, seizures and other medical problems. Those eligible would include people suffering from cancer, glaucoma, AIDS, multiple sclerosis and other diseases. Supporters argue that

marijuana helps ease the pain, muscle spasms and nausea that can accompany chemotherapy treatments for cancer.

The state Health Department would issue registry cards to patients who get doctors to certify that they have medical needs that could be treated with marijuana. Qualified patients and their designated caregivers could not be arrested or prosecuted for having up to an ounce of marijuana. They also could have up to six marijuana plants, which would have to

be kept in a locked place. Opponents of the measure argue that the U.S. Food and Drug Administration has approved a legal drug, dronabinol, which contains the active ingredient in marijuana, and doctors can prescribe those pills for patients with pain and

hronic illness. Dr. Blake Curd of Sioux Falls, an opponent of medical marijuana, said research has not demonstrated smoked marijuana to be helpful as medicine. Reistroffer said patients

have said the dronabinol pills are not as effective as marijuana that is eaten, smoked or vaporized. "Our groups really has a sincere effort to protect the most severely ill people in

our state," Reistroffer said.

have their heads shaved,' he said.

Rik said it was still hard to believe his wife would appear on a show seen by millions of viewers on several networks.

"It's unreal. It's something I would never have expected," he said. "But we are getting the word out that childhood cancer is bigger than most people think it is."

The Zortmans now live in Avoca, Iowa, and Rik is staying at home this week with their children. He said his wife was rolling through a whirlwind schedule while in Los Angeles. "Lindsay left for L.A. on

Monday. They had their heads shaved on Tuesday in support of the fight against childhood cancer,' Rik said. "On Friday, they were supposed to be at the studio early for rehearsals. Then, there was the show and the after-party. She was to be there from 8:30 a.m. to 8:30 p.m. (Pacific time), so she was looking at a 12-hour day."

The "46 Mommas" are seeking to raise at least \$1 million for childhood cancer research through the St. Baldrick's Foundation, the world's largest volunteer-driven fundraising program for childhood cancer research.

The Zortmans hope that the "46 Mommas" and the "Stand Up To Cancer" telethon will provide valuable awareness as well as donations.

"Most of the cancer research dollars go to cancer in adults. Only 3 percent goes toward childhood cancer," Rik said. "It's frustrating to see all the kids who get (cancer) and suffer with it. They don't know how they got it, and then they try to get

through it.' The "46" carries a special significance, representing the number of children diagnosed with cancer each weekday in the United States, Rik said.

For the Zortmans, their day came in November 2008, when they received a stunning phone call from their baby-sitter that Armstrong had suffered a seizure. At the time of the call, Rik was serving in Iraq with a U.S. contractor while Lindsay was attending a business meeting 120 miles from home.

Armstrong was flown to Omaha for medical treatment, where he was diagnosed with a Glioblastoma Multiforme brain tumor and a second, much more

aggressive condition which was an unknown Glioma. Armstrong was named for Lance Armstrong, because the Zortmans admired the cyclist's courage in his battle with cancer. The couple didn't realize that their son would develop cancer himself. losing his fight with the disease only 4 1/2 months after a series of surgeries and treatments at different

medical centers. Lindsay testified before the Food and Drug Administration, winning approval to use the new drug, Avastin, for Armstrong. He received his first dose April 3, 2009, but the treatment had little time to make an impact as

he died six days later. The Zortmans have continued battling for other families dealing with childhood cancer. That includes her last-minute willingness to participate in the "Stand Up To Cancer" telethon. "One of the '46

Mommas' had to back out of the trip to L.A., and Lindsay took her place,"

Rik said. Friday may not necessarily be Lindsay's last appearance on national television. She is waiting to learn if she qualifies for the television series "The Biggest Loser," which pits contestants seeking to lose

the most weight. The "Biggest Loser' appearance would continue Lindsay's effort to improve her health and achieve goals she never thought possible. The appearance would also offer a tribute to Armstrong's courage, she said.

Landing a spot on the television series could also benefit the fight against

"The winner gets a quarter-million dollars," she said. "Even I get on the show and end up (eliminated) the first day, I could win \$100,000 for losing the most weight at home. would use part of the money to support research for a cure for childhood cancer."

Rik said he supports his wife in all her efforts, including the upcoming shot at another national

television appearance. "She would be on 'The Biggest Loser,' but to me, she's the biggest winner,

he said.
