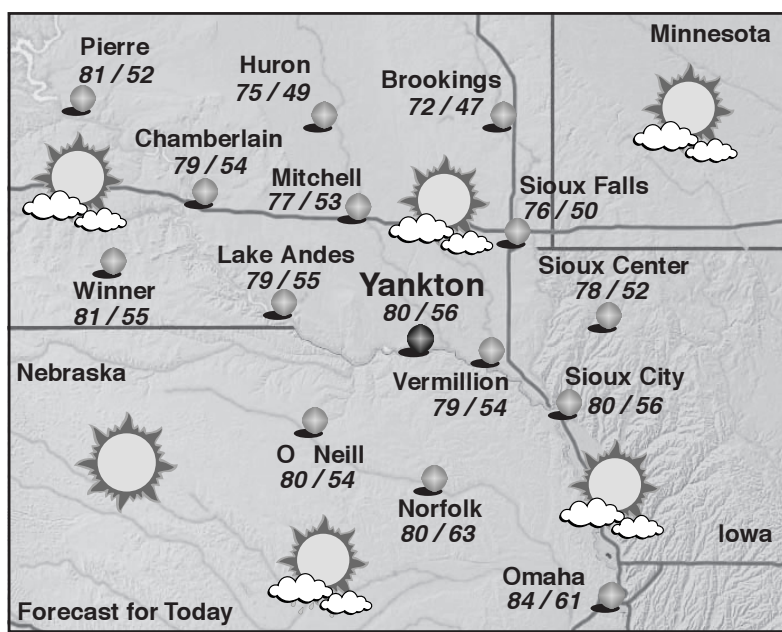

### Crest Road To Be Closed Tuesday Morning

The road that crosses Gavins Point Dam, also known as Crest Road or the spillway, will be closed from 8 a.m.-noon Tuesday to conduct maintenance on road. Alternate routes should be taken.

### Hazardous Waste Collection Event Set For Oct.

Two household hazardous waste collections will be held in early October. The first will be from noon to 6 p.m. Friday, Oct. 1, at the Vermillion Missouri Valley Recycling Center, 840 N. Crawford Road, Vermillion. On Oct. 2, a household hazardous waste collection will be held from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. at the Yankton Transfer Station & Recycling Center, 23rd and Kellen Gross Drive, Yankton.

There is a \$10 fee per vehicle to help defray the collection cost. This collection provides opportunities for residents to safely dispose of products containing harmful chemicals. Unless used and disposed of according to directions, these household chemicals present a threat to the environment. Special handling is required to dispose of them properly. Materials collected are recycled, or disposed in hazardous waste landfills or incinerators. A licensed private company under contract to the Missouri Valley Recycling Center provides these services.

- Examples of household hazardous waste include:
- Cleaning supplies — room deodorizers, oven cleaner; sanitizer; drain cleaners; toilet bowl cleaners; NiCad batteries; floor polish; silver and metal polishes; nail polish; furniture polish; mothballs; floor wax; disinfectants; and powdered bleach.
  - Household products — fluorescent bulbs; mercury switches and thermometers; bug sprays; flea collars; peroxides; and medicines.
  - Shop, hobby area and repair supplies — latex paint; oil based paint; used oil; used anti-freeze; cleaners, thinners and solvents; lubricants, glues and adhesives; stains, strippers and preservatives; lead acid batteries; oil filters; and containers with unknown substances.
  - Yard, garden and farm supplies — pesticides, herbicides and other products.

The state Department of Agriculture will be on site to receive farm products. Why should you clean your house of unusable or unwanted household hazardous waste (HHW)? Certain types of HHW have the potential to cause physical injury to sanitation workers, contaminate septic tanks or wastewater treatment systems if poured down drains or toilets, and present hazards to children and pets if left around the house. Read product labels for disposal directions to reduce the risk of products exploding, igniting, leaking, mixing with other chemicals, or posing other hazards on the way to a disposal facility. Even empty containers of HHW can pose hazards because of the residual chemicals that might remain.

You can help reduce HHW disposal costs. In 2009, Missouri River Recycling paid more than \$20,000 to dispose of HHW received from residents. Although proper disposal of HHW is important, it is even more important to avoid purchasing hazardous items and substitute them with non-hazardous alternatives.

You can help reduce the cost of this program by:

- avoiding the purchase of hazardous household materials;
- using up what you buy;
- giving away what you cannot use; and
- using safer alternatives.

well under the engineer's estimate. It was believed construction of the fence would come in around \$477,000. However, the apparent low bid, submitted by Custom Fence of Logan, Utah, was \$350,000.

Two other bids were also received — a \$395,000 bid from American Fence of Sioux Falls, and an \$859,000 bid from Willard Schmidt of Yankton.

Yankton Public Services Director Kevin Kuhl said a grant application for the project has been submitted to the Federal Aviation Administration.

"We should hear back about it fairly soon," he said. "It would cover all expenses for the project and some associated environmental issues."

As part of the grant agreement, the city would be responsible for \$13,000, and the South Dakota Department of Transportation would be responsible for \$19,000.

In addition to keeping animals off the property, Carlson said the fence would also deter humans looking to steal a plane. The June break-in to the airport alleged to have been committed by Colton Harris-Moore, known widely as the "Barefoot Bandit," was fresh in his mind, Carlson admitted.

"Ultimately, this will make the airport safer for the flying public," he said.
