the same time, the state has greatly exceeded that rate.

He said he is embarrassed at how the state has funded education.

"We have the lowest paid teachers in the county — we are 51 out of 51 in teacher pay," he said. "They say we have a low standard of living in South Dakota. Yes, we do, we are about 93 percent of the national average here in South Dakota. Our teachers are down in the 60-percent range. We took \$26.3 million from the federal government for education and turned around and put it into the general fund of the government. That is not right. That money was supposed to go to education."

Norin said the latest appropriate

tion of funds designated for education pulled into the general fund of the state was the last straw.

"I am one of the school board members in Centerville, who for the last 13 years has watched the Legislature take away money from the schools," she said. "I have watched them take money that really and truly belongs to our children, and turn around and spend it on something like the oil line coming through the state."

The time has come for change, Norin said.

"I believe the people of South Dakota have had their fill of what is going on. I believe they have had their fill of opt-outs to raise their taxes to balance the school budgets, when this is clearly a constitutional issue that the Legislature is supposed to fund education," she said. "Education is supposed to be the first thing funded, not the last."

However, Hunhoff said perhaps the biggest issue facing the

Legislature this year is the fact that there is not a true checks-and-balances system in the state.

"We have a weak Legislature in South Dakota and a strong executive office, which is not fundamental to a strong state government," he said. "The checks and balances are so important to a strong government, and we lack them in South Dakota. The state Legislature has become an office of the governor."

He said the last legislative session produced "a perfect example of that." He said that toward the end of the session, both Democrats and Republicans were close to agreeing on a budget that he believed would have received close to unanimous approval. However, last-minute demands from the governor's office changed the whole process.

"Right in the closing hours, the governor's office got involved, demanded certain things from the Republican caucus and, in the end,

they again got what they wanted," he said. "It wasn't the best budget for South Dakota. Everybody went home and kind of wondered, 'What happened there?'"

"That is not the way government is supposed to work. I think Democrats are as much to blame as the Republicans, frankly. We have to go home now and tell the voters what happened in the past and what we are hoping to accomplish in the future."

The Democratic seven-point plan includes:

- cutting frills;
- balancing the budget without tax increases;
- demanding openness and competition for contracts;
- ending corporate welfare;
- funding schools at appropriate levels;
- implement spending limits for state government;
- freeing full-time equivalent employee (FTE) hires.
