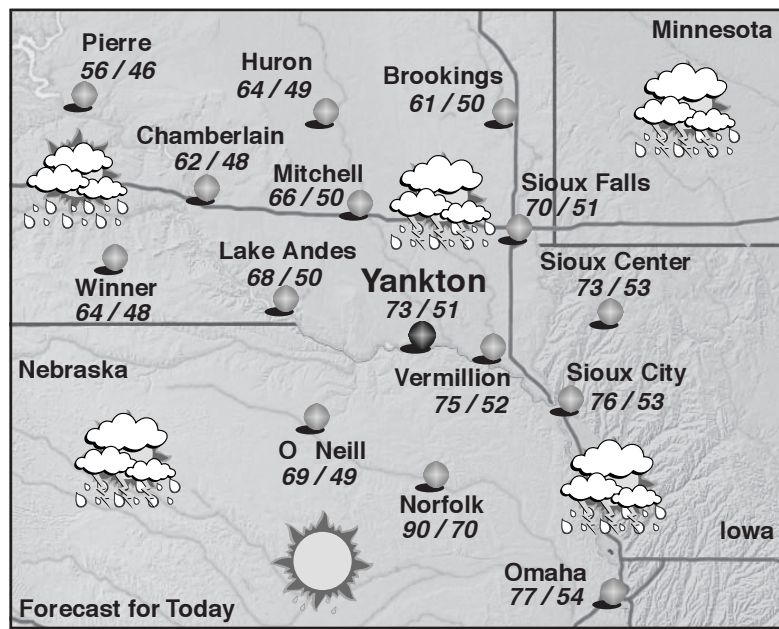

CHICAGO (AP) — Grain futures were mixed Wednesday on the Chicago Board of Trade.
 Wheat for December delivery rose 1.75 cents to \$7.1975 a bushel; December corn shed 0.25 cent to \$5.05 bushel; December oats fell 7.5 cents to \$3.44 a bushel; while soybeans for November delivery gained 8.5 cents to

\$10.885 a bushel.
 Beef and pork futures traded flat or lower on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.
 October live cattle dropped 1.33 cents to 96.17 cents a pound; October feeder cattle fell 1.63 cents to \$1.0902 a pound; October lean hogs slid 0.60 cent to 78.70 cents a pound; while February pork bellies were flat at \$1.0850 a pound.

"This is our second severe weather season. It happens in September," she said. "We have an active weather pattern, where a lot of fronts come through."

Normally, this time of year lacks the heat and moisture that ignites major storms, Laffin said. "It's cool, and a lot of the time it's pretty dry in the fall," she said. "It's not typically where you see a lot of severe thunderstorm warnings this late in the season."

During Wednesday's storms, Vermillion was hit with baseball-sized hail. The damage appeared limited to the north and northwest parts of the city.

Wal-Mart, on the northern edge of Vermillion, sustained damage, according to Clay County emergency manager Layne Stewart.

"Wal-Mart had some skylights broken, and several windshields (of customers were hit)," he said. "As far as I know, (we had) no major damage or injuries. We had some large hail and heavy rains north of Vermillion, but spotters did not report any high winds or tornado activity."

Capt. Chad Passick with the Vermillion Police Department received similar reports of storm damage.

"We saw several vehicles with their windows broken," he said. "We saw some heavy rain and then hail. There was nothing severe. Our damage came from the earlier storm. The second one missed us and went to the north."

The storm apparently traveled from west to east, following Highway 50, Passick said.

"We had (eastbound) vehicles traveling between Yankton and Vermillion that ... received some damage on the highway west of town," he said.

Vermillion was not the only Clay County site hit by the storm. Walnut-sized hail, about 1.25 inches in diameter, was reported at Wakonda.

Yankton County emergency

manager Jeremy Dangel reported two strong downpours of rain during the day. Yankton County received mostly pea- to marble-sized hail but dodged the large hail that hit Clay County, he said.

"The first storm (Wednesday) morning really was the south half of the city of Yankton, over into the Gayville area, basically through the southeastern part of the county," he said. "Then it went through the Meckling and Vermillion areas and over the river."

In contrast, the second storm covered Yankton County from north to south, Dangel said.

"There was a little bit of small hail over the entire county during the second storm, but there was nothing major for damage," he said.

Various weather activities were reported Wednesday around the region.

• Knox County emergency manager Laura Hintz reported hail around 10:30 a.m.

"They had golf-ball sized hail about three miles north of Bloomfield, and quarter-sized hail at Crofton at about the same time," she said. "This morning was kind of the first go-round, and then what we had over the noon hour. I haven't heard of anything else. We had just a drop or two of rain here in Center."

Another round of heavy rainfall hit the area Wednesday night, setting off flash flooding in Knox County, according to the NWS office in Omaha/Valley, Neb.

Some minor street flooding was beginning to occur in Crofton, the NWS reported. Flash flooding was also forecast for Verdigris, Center, Lindy and other rural locations in central Knox County.

• Cedar County emergency manager Kevin Garvin reported storm activity in the northern part of the county. Radar indicated nearly one-inch hail in the Wynot, Neb., area.

On Wednesday night, numerous thunderstorms with very heavy rainfall was moving across northern Cedar County. Radar estimated that 3 to 4 inches of rain had fallen across

the area during the day, according to the NWS. Runoff from excessive rainfall was forecast to cause flash flooding in Fordyce, St. Helena and Wynot.

The warned area included U.S. Highway 81 in Nebraska, between Mile Markers 197 and 206.

• Bon Homme County received mostly rain, said emergency manager Jon Vavruska.

"We had from a half-inch to 1-1/2 inches of rain throughout the county," he said. "We had some pea-sized hail just west of Tyndall. Up at Scotland, they had some pea-sized to walnut-sized hail. There wasn't any strong winds with the walnut-sized hail, and it just fell straight down."

The most rain fell in the Tyndall area, while the Avon area in the western part of the county saw the lesser amounts, he said.

The heavy rain caused some creeks to rise, but Vavruska said he doesn't anticipate any flooding. He expects Bon Homme County to see its only flooding along the Missouri River bottom near Springfield because of the higher releases.

The rainfall will cause some delay in fall field work, Vavruska said. "Farmers attempting to do combining or harvesting will be put on hold for a while," he said.

• Turner County emergency manager Tom Gillespie reported mostly dime- to quarter-sized hail, particularly in the Hurley and Parker areas. Reports were received of one-inch hail in Parker. Hail of 1.75 inches in diameter was reported two miles north of Chancellor.

Wednesday's heavy rains will likely cause a rise in the Vermillion River, which runs through Turner and Clay counties, Gillespie said. The river

flooded earlier this year.

"It looks like we will see some rise, but not a significant rise, in the Vermillion River during the next 24 hours, but it shouldn't be a problem," he said.

Neighboring counties reported limited hail damage. In Hutchinson County, quarter-sized hail, about one inch in diameter, was received six miles east-northeast of Menno. In Union County, Alcester received hail the size of ping-pong balls along with heavy rain.

Wednesday's storm relied on a major energy boost, Laffin said. This time of year, the system had more time for the hail to get bigger and less time for it to melt, she said.

"There wasn't a lot of heat and not any sun (Wednesday) morning," she said. "Basically, we needed a really strong boundary and upper level disturbance to get this going."

The northern United States typically wouldn't see much effect from the recent hurricanes and tropical storms, and the current front has deflected that weather, Laffin said.

Another storm system that passed through the region Wednesday night — and brought an extended tornado watch — resulted from another wave of activities moving north from south-central Nebraska, she said.

However, the first days of autumn should bring more stable weather, Laffin said.

"This (was) more of a one-day deal," she said of Wednesday's unseasonable weather. "(Thursday), we should see more of a steady rain during the day. We are looking at this system to clear out Thursday, and Friday will see temperatures in the lower 70s."
