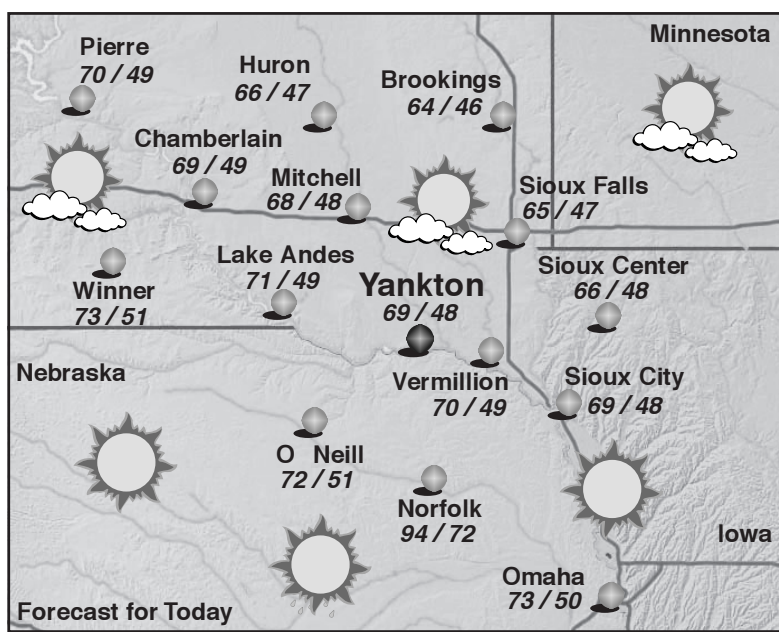

Man Charged With Pulling Knife In Wal-Mart

The Yankton Police Department arrested a man early Thursday morning after he allegedly threatened an individual with a knife. Brandon Leslie, 18, Yankton, was arrested for aggravated assault with a weapon.

Also, a 17-year-old female who was with Leslie during the incident was arrested for misprision of a felony, meaning she did not report the incident.

According to a media release, a 9-1-1 call was received at approximately 12:15 a.m. about a man pulling a knife on a person in Yankton's Wal-Mart.

Assistant Police Chief Jerry Hisek said Leslie followed some Hispanic individuals around Wal-Mart as they were shopping and made racial slurs. One of the individuals turned around to confront Leslie about the comments. At that point, Leslie is reported to have pulled a knife and opened it. He then left the building.

Hisek said the individuals did not appear to know each other.

Police worked with Wal-Mart employees to identify Leslie, and he and the juvenile female were arrested at a residence along Douglas Avenue.

Hay To Be Removed From Right Of Way

PIERRE — The South Dakota Department of Transportation requests the cooperation of all farmers and ranchers in removing processed hay from the highway right of way. State regulations require that hay be removed from the right of way within 30 days of being processed, but no later than Oct. 1.

Removing hay bales from the highway right of way is an important safety consideration for motorists. The bales or stacks can be a safety hazard for vehicles forced to leave the road and, in some cases, can restrict a driver's sight distance. Hay left in the road ditches late in the year can also cause snowdrifts across the highway.

"I really enjoyed learning about agriculture through the various projects and events that I participated in," Sutura said. "I knew that somehow I wanted to be involved with those organizations when I grew up."

Sutura attended South Dakota State University (SDSU) and majored in Agriculture Education and spent three summers at the Brookings County Extension office as a work-study student. He later did his student-teaching at the Watertown High School Vo-Ag department.

"I started my Extension career right out of college," Sutura said. His first employment was as an assistant county agent in Brookings County — a position

that no longer exists.

"I'm fortunate that there were training positions when I started working for the Extension service. It was an excellent way for me to learn what it really took to be a county agent," he said.

While working under the tutelage of Don Boone, Sutura completed his masters at SDSU in 1980, and the state Extension service and Brookings County hired him to continue working in Brookings as a full-time county agent.

In 1984, he applied for the county agent position in Bon Homme County, previously held by Steve Auch, and remained there for more than 26 years.

"I've had several title changes over the years," Sutura admitted. "I went from the assistant agent position to county agent, to Extension agent, and now Extension educator," he said.

Sutura added that it was not only the names that changed, but

the responsibilities of the job have evolved over the years.

"I went from a 'generalist' to a more specific area of emphasis, which is agronomy," he explained. "Some days I still feel like I'm the new kid on the block — learning new technologies and methods of program delivery."

Though based in Bon Homme County, Sutura's role included involvement with the Bon Homme-Hutchinson-Yankton County "cluster," which later evolved into Field Education Units (FEU).

"Our first unit consisted of Bon Homme, Hutchinson, Yankton, Clay, Turner, Lincoln and Union counties," he added. "Now we are a part of the Bon Homme, Hutchinson, Charles Mix and Douglas FEU."

Sutura said he always enjoyed the variety his position as Extension educator provided.

"No two days were alike," he said, adding that the real satisfaction of the job for him was work-

ing for and with people.

Sutura has also worked with a variety of other organizations through the years, such as the Cattlemen's Association, Pork Producers, Weed & Pest Board, Crop Improvement, and of course all the 4-H clubs. He said he plans to step up his involvement with some of those now that he'll have more time, but he admits he's most partial to helping with 4-H.

"There is no doubt in my mind, had I not been involved in 4-H as a youth, I wouldn't have chosen Extension as a career," he said.

And now that career has brought Sutura's life full circle, back to his beginnings.

Residing on the family farm once again, Sutura said he's looking forward to spending more time with his wife, Gergette, and other family.

"I want to do some traveling and enjoy my hobby as a part-time farmer," he said, "and continue helping with 4-H, however I can."

CHICAGO (AP) — Grain futures mostly fell Thursday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for December delivery tumbled 22.5 cents to \$6.9725 a bushel; December corn dropped 5.75 cents to \$4.9925 a bushel; December oats fell 6 cents to \$3.38 a bushel; while soybeans for November delivery gained 5 cents to \$10.935 a bushel.

Beef and pork futures traded mixed on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

December live cattle edged up 0.05 cent to 98.25 cents a pound; November feeder cattle added 0.15 cent to \$1.0985 a pound; December lean hogs slid 0.30 cent to 76.02 cents a pound; while February pork bellies were flat at \$1.0850 a pound.
