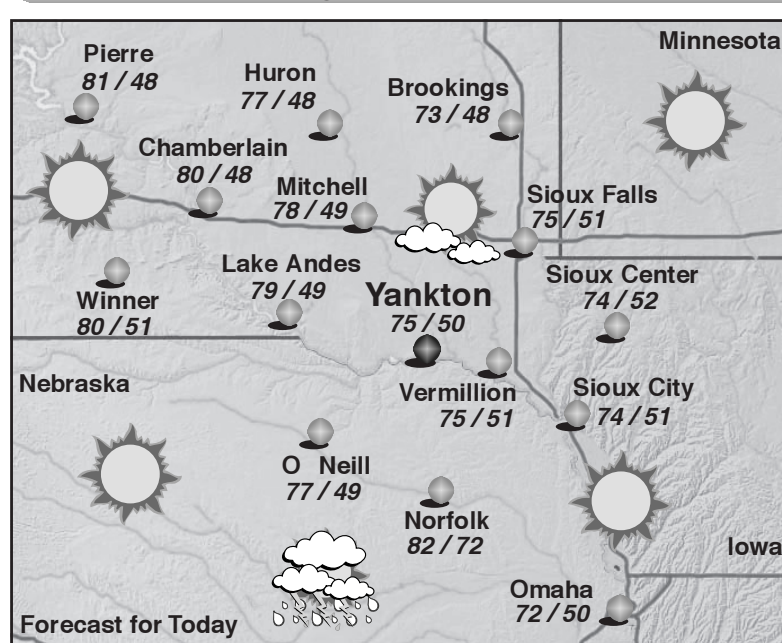

Highway 44 To Be Closed For Repair

PARKSTON — Today (Monday), the South Dakota Department of Transportation will begin work to raise the grade where Mayer Lake flooded South Dakota Highway 44 about 17 miles east of Parkston, between mile marker 366 and 367.
 This one-mile section of road is closed until further notice. Motorists are asked to use an alternate route.

Flooding Closes Roads In Southeast S.D.

The South Dakota Department of Transportation has closed the following highways until further notice due to flooding:
 • The Big Sioux River has risen and flooded S.D. Highway 46 near the Iowa state line. S.D. 46 is closed from mile marker 381 to 382.66.
 • The Big Sioux River has risen and flooded S.D. Highway 48 at the Iowa State Line. S.D. 48 is closed from mile marker 383 to 384.23.
 • The Vermillion River is threatening to overtop the roadway surface on S.D. 19 south of Centerville. Be alert to changing conditions in this area.
 Motorists are urged to use caution when approaching sections where water is flowing adjacent to or over a road. Do not attempt to drive through water covering the road as it may be washed out underneath. Turn around. Don't risk drowning.



 some homes had been sand-bagged. A residential area downstream that has not flooded before was a concern if the river continues to rise, Schmitz said.
 Officials were worried that the sanitary sewer system would fill and raw sewage would have to be discharged. About 340 households on the Renner

Sanitary Sewer District were asked to limit their water use to keep from adding wastewater to the system.
 The flooding closed many secondary roads in Minnehaha County and might attract people who need to stay away, said Sheriff Mike Milestead.
 "With this nice weather all we need is people bringing out their kayaks and canoes and going on the river," he said in suggesting the governor temporarily close the river and several other creeks to recreational use.
 "You want it, you got it," the

governor replied.
 Four teens had to be rescued Saturday after jumping into the Big Sioux River downstream near Brandon.
 Portions of the James River and Vermillion River in eastern South Dakota also were flooding, mostly on agricultural land, following a wet summer.
 June-through-August rainfall records included 21 inches at Brookings, 23 inches at Mitchell, 22 inches at Sioux Falls, and 26 inches at Marion, the NWS said.

 "And that'll be an incredibly expensive undertaking," Ball said the presence of Emerald ash borer is another reminder to diversify the community forest, especially after elm trees were subjected to a devastating insect of their own.
 The Dutch elm disease, a fungal disease spread by the elm bark beetle, was inadvertently introduced in the United States in the late 1920s. Making its way westward from New England, the disease eventually reached the Midwest by the 1970s.

"When we lost our elms then, people got the wrong message and planted only ash, which brings us to our current problem," Ball said. "Now there are too many."
 To avoid future threats, we need to plant a wider range of species.
 During his presentation, Ball will provide visual examples of possible, lesser-known tree species, as well as a question-and-answer session.
 Yankton County Extension Service horticulturist Cynthia Bergman will also provide information about master gardener training for 2011 in Yankton, Missouri Valley.
 Master Gardeners, sponsors of the event, will provide door prizes.

Hartington Firm Fined In Worker's Death

CROFTON, Neb. (AP) — The Occupational Safety and Health Administration has fined a Hartington communications company for violations it says led to the death of worker trapped in a collapsed trench.
 Television station KTIV says Hartelco Incorporated was ordered to be \$4,410 by Oct. 12. Authorities have said 48-year-old Galen Jueden of Hartington and a co-worker were working in a trench in northern Knox County when it collapsed June 4. Rescuers pulled both men from the trench, but Jueden died at the scene.
 Among the violations cited by OSHA were failing to properly shore up the trench and depositing soil less than 2 feet from the side of the trench.
 A Hartelco official declined to comment Saturday.
