MILITARY BRIEFS

MICHAEL BILLMAN

Michael J. Billman graduated from the U.S. Army Warrant Officer Candidate School at Fort Rucker, Daleville, Ala., and was appointed to the rank of warrant officer one. The student completed an intense six-week course conducted in a very demanding, rigorous, high-stressed and deadline-required environment. The candidate received training in leadership skills, Army customs, doctrine, tradition, and tactics, drill and ceremonies, professional ethics, physical fitness, time-stress-people management skills, decision making, delegation and personnel skills, and numerous other military academic subjects. They gain experience in leadership to attain higher responsibility while maintaining professionalism and quality work performance and standards required of career warrant officers. Additionally, candidates develop and hone skills relevant to an Army at war, skills required to effectively operate and survive on today's ever-changing battlefield operations against global terrorism.

Warrant officers continue to further their training through technical and tactical certification. As the officers gain progressive levels of expertise and leadership, they operate, maintain, administer and manage equipment, support activities or technical systems throughout their Army career. They are highly specialized technical and training experts in their career specialties who provide valuable skills, guidance and expertise to commanders and organizations. The newly appointed warrant officer will serve as a field artillery targeting technician assigned to Fort Bragg, Fayetteville, N.C.

The warrant officer has served in the military for 12 years. He is the son of Laurie A. Lacy of Centerville. Billman is a 1998 graduate of Centerville High School.

2ND LT. PAUL N. GIBSON

Army National Guard 2nd Lt. Paul N. Gibson graduated from the Armor Officer Basic Course at Fort Knox, Ky.

The course trains Army and Marine Corps lieutenants in leadership skills, tactics, gunnery, maintenance and operational aspects of weapons and vehicles used in an armor platoon. The

course incorporates a challenging training methodology called the "Gauntlet," a field training exercise, experience-based learning method that combines basic armor officer students with non-commissioned officers from the U.S. Army Noncommissioned Officers Academy and captains attending the Armor Captains' Career Course. After 16 weeks of instruction, the second lieutenants are assigned to tank and cavalry platoons prepared to lead mounted maneuver forces in the full spectrum of combat operations.

Gibson, an armor officer, is assigned to the 2nd Battalion, 16th Cavalry Regiment, Fort Knox, Ky. He has served in the military for five years.

He is the son of Randy Gibson of Dante.

The lieutenant graduated in 2002 from Avon High School and received a bachelor's degree in 2009 from South Dakota State University, Brookings.

PVT. BRITNEY M. BACKSTROM

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For The Cure to Vermillion. Abbott was only expecting around 500 people the first year, but 2,000 registered.

Last year, 2,200 people registered for the event, and unofficial reports had almost 3,000 people registered for this year's event.

"We thought there weren't going to be as many because of the weather," said Colleen VanLoh, Abbott's twin sister. "Unofficially, I think there were 100 more people registered online before (Sunday) morning."

"Each year, you look around and it seems like there are more and more people," she added. "You see more groups and the T-shirts they make, and it's pretty cool."

Registration for the Race For The Cure was \$25 with participants able to give more donations. Plus, 75 percent of the money raised for the event stays in South Dakota for breast cancer treatment and research.

Last year, \$200,000 was raised in South Dakota for breast cancer

treatment and research.

Nicole Mockler led team "Save The Hoots," which raised \$500 for the event.

"Most of the money stays in South Dakota, and every dollar helps," she said.

This was the first year "Save The Hoots" participated in the Race For The Cure.

No one on Mockler's team has been or have had a family affected by breast cancer, but everyone walked to help the cause.

"We walked to support awareness and it's a great cause," she said. "It gets emotional to be with family and friends during this, and you meet some great people throughout the day. We plan to do it again next year, and hopefully have a bigger team."

The Race For The Cure was emotional for a lot of people. Breast cancer survivors could easily be pointed out, as they were given blue shirts to wear instead of the regular white and pink shirts.

"I haven't had anyone in my family affected by breast cancer, but I know a lot of people who have survived, and other who haven't," VanLoh said. "That's who you do it for. When you are out there, that's who is on your heart."

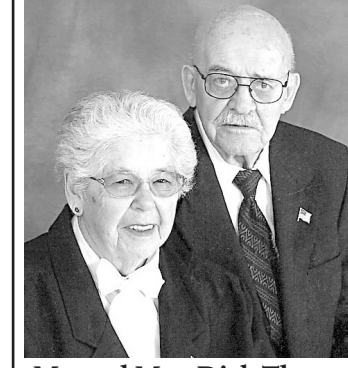
