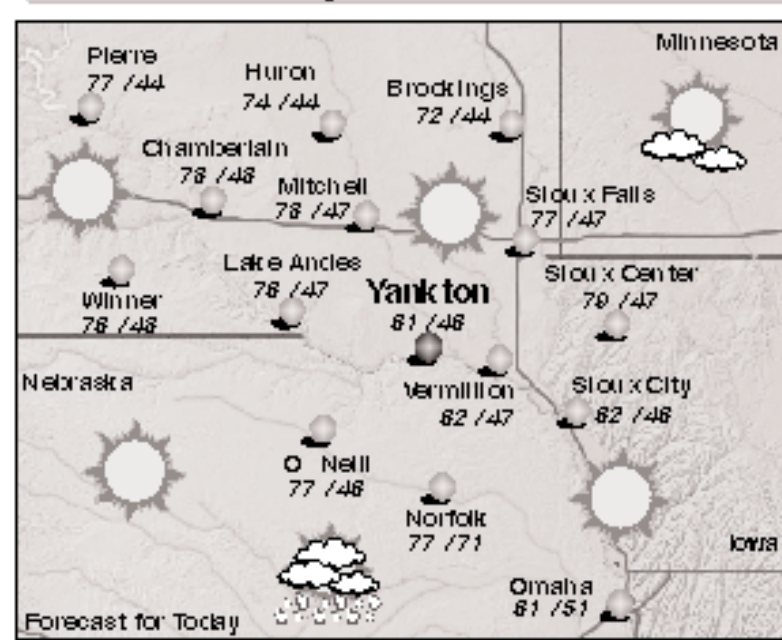

to get back to work or school, and it just compounds the problem. You end up with a lot of people transmitting. If you are young and healthy, you are just going to feel sick with it. But if you are at risk of complications, it is a very dangerous thing.

While several fairly simple steps — washing your hands, not touching your face, covering your mouth with arms rather than hands when coughing or sneezing — are often touted to help prevent the spread of influenza the best bet is to get a flu shot, Johnson said.

Currently, several "flu clinics" are being offered in the area. Yankton HyVee is holding one today where they expect more than 100 people to participate. Walgreen's said that it has been having 15-20 people a day come in for shots since it got the vaccine in.

"People can come in and get a flu shot at the clinic, reservations are not required," said Galen Goeden, pharmacy manager at HyVee. "It is just a convenient way

to do it. Last year we had between 100-200 per clinic. It is a fairly popular way to get shots done."

Last year, HyVee did more than 400 shots through the season. Vermillion released a flu shot schedule this week as well, announcing two upcoming clinics a children's only clinic scheduled from 4-7 p.m. Wednesday, Oct. 6, and a clinic open to the general public from 4-7 p.m. Tuesday, Oct. 19. Both clinics will be held at the high school commons.

As for Yankton's school clinics, Johnson said that the vaccines are just arriving and to expect information within the next few weeks.

"People sometimes fear the safety of the vaccine, but it has been well tested," Johnson said. "Out of every one million people that get the vaccine only one or two will have a reaction. Usually it will be an allergic reaction. But if you are at a health professional getting your shot, then they have medications to take care of the reaction."

Johnson also stressed that there are certain sections of the population that are at greater risk to influenza and that it is necessary to take extra precautions when dealing with them.

"People in the hospital or long-term care are very vulnerable to

side effects, so don't go visit people if you think you have the flu or have been exposed to the flu," she said. "If you take care of someone in a high-risk group, then, it is a good idea for you to get the flu shot as well."

According to the CDC, those most at risk who should get a flu shot include:

- all children ages six months and up;
- pregnant women and women who may become pregnant during the flu season;
- people 50 years and older;
- adults and children with certain chronic conditions.

To prevent transmission to high-risk populations, vaccination is also recommended for:

- healthcare workers;
- caregivers of children less than six months of age and adults over age 50;
- adults and children who live with children less than six months of age;
- adults and children who live with or care for persons with medical conditions that put them at higher risk for severe complications from influenza.

### CHICAGO BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grain futures fell Tuesday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for December delivery tumbled 21.75 cents to \$6.8475 a bushel; December corn slid 12.75 cents to \$5.00 a bushel; December oats fell 10 cents to \$3.38 a bushel; and soybeans for November delivery shed 18.5 cents to \$11.00 a bushel.

Beef and pork futures traded mixed on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.

December live cattle ended unchanged at 99.30 cents a pound; November feeder cattle gained 0.83 cent to \$1.1060 a pound; December lean hogs dropped 0.87 cent to 75.90 cents a pound; while February pork bellies were flat at \$1.0850 a pound.
